# Sask. on brink as EMS staffing crisis deepens

Concerns over local ambulance availability and staffing shortages dominated a recent meeting between the Town of Whitewood and representatives from the Saskatchewan Health Authority, who acknowledged that emergency medical services across the province are facing one of the most challenging staffing crises in years.

Over the summer, several incidents occurred where the Whitewood ambulance was out of service due to lack of paramedic coverage, forcing units from neighboring communities to respond to local emergencies which obviously takes those unit(s) from another community. "We just wanted to get a feeling of what's going on and see if there's anything the town can do to help ensure we don't lose a vital service," Mayor Chris Ashfield said during the meeting.

SHA representatives Glen Perchie, Director/Chief of EMS - South and Jon Antal, Manager/Deputy Chief, EMS - South Central spent approximately 30 minutes speaking with council, where they explained the current EMS situation and outlined where changes need to be made to ensure paramedic services can continue to operate throughout Saskatchewan.

"So as much as I don't like being in this position, I actually really appreciate that you are asking this. We're not okay with this either," Antal said of the current challenges and confirmed that the shortage is a province-wide issue, with vacancies in nearly every EMS service. "We are probably in the worst shape we've been in for years in EMS in Saskatchewan. There is some light at the end of the tunnel, but it'll be six to eight months before we see the effects of new training seats opening up."

Last year, the province funded an additional 100 seats in the primary care paramedic program, but only about one-third of graduates end up working in EMS. Many are being hired by municipal fire departments, which offer higher wages and better schedules. "We need to be more competitive with our peer emergency

# First-degree murder charges laid against youth following death in Whitewood

Around 2:00 p.m. November 6, Saskatchewan RCMP received a report of an injured adult male at a residence in Whitewood, SK. Broadview RCMP responded and located the injured male inside the residence. The adult male was transported

to hospital where they were pronounced deceased. Their death is considered suspicious and the Saskatchewan RCMP's Regina General Investigation Section and Major Crimes police officers took carriage of the investigation.

A male youth was arrested by police at the residence. During the arrest the male was injured and was taken to hospital as

a precaution. He has since been released back into police custody.

As a result of investigation and consultation with Crown, a male youth is charged with one count, first degree murder, section 235(1) of the Criminal Code in relation to the death of the adult male. Both males are from Broadview Detachment area.

We cannot provide any more descriptions as there is risk the youth could be identified, which is prohibited under the Youth Criminal Justice Act.

This investigation is continuing with the assistance of the RCMP Forensic Identification Section, Broadview RCMP Detachment and Saskatchewan Coroners Service.

## 'Canada Strong' budget draws praise for investment push, criticism for rising debt

Prime Minister Mark Carney's first federal budget, billed as a blueprint to make Canada "strong, self-sufficient, and resilient," has sparked both optimism and concern — hailed by some as a bold shift toward domestic investment and by critics as another round of record spending.

Unveiled on Nov. 4, *Budget 2025: Canada Strong* pledges to transform Canada's economy by investing \$1 trillion over five years in major infrastructure, housing, and industrial projects. A central feature is the new Buy Canadian Policy, which will require federal departments, Crown corporations, and major publicly funded projects to prioritize Canadian-made materials, technology, and services whenever possible.

"Budget 2025 is our plan to build Canada strong — with major infrastructure projects, millions more homes, new defence industries, and thousands of new high-quality careers all across our country," Carney said. "As we build big and bold, we will build Canadian and buy Canadian."

The government is earmarking \$186 million to fully implement the policy. That includes \$98.2 million over five years for Public Services and Procurement Canada to ensure compliance across all departments and \$79.9 million to launch a new Small and Medium Business Procurement Program, designed to help Canadian firms compete for federal contracts.

Finance Minister François-Philippe Champagne said the move will strengthen domestic supply chains and reduce reliance on foreign partners. "We can control who we buy from — and we choose to buy Canadian," he said. "Building economic strength starts with becoming our own best customer."

The policy will extend to housing, defence, and infrastructure projects — part of the government's effort to direct as much as \$70 billion in public spending toward Canadian businesses and workers.

Despite the government's assurances, opposition MPs and fiscal watchdogs warn that the budget's ambitions come at a steep cost.

The government projects a \$78-billion deficit this fiscal year, up from \$62 billion previously forecast. Debt interest charges are expected to hit \$55.6 billion — more than Ottawa's total annual health transfers to provinces.

Yorkton-Melville MP Cathay Wagantall said the budget relies too heavily on borrowed money and offers little relief for average Canadians.

"It's all new spending," Wagantall told Grasslands News. "They're casting a \$78-billion deficit, and the debt is at \$1.35 trillion. We're adding \$10 million to our debt every hour — and interest payments alone are higher than what we spend on health care."

She said while some initiatives — such as \$108 million to support agriculture export markets and modernize the Canadian Food Inspection Agency — could

benefit Saskatchewan, the overall plan "depends on private-sector uptake" without removing regulatory barriers that drive investment away.

"They're saying the private sector has to show up now, but businesses left for a reason," Wagantall said. "We're just not competitive."

She also questioned the government's focus on modular housing, noting Carney's past advocacy for the approach during his tenure in the private sector. "The question is: will these homes be an investment for young Canadians or for corporations?"

The Canadian Taxpayers Federation echoed those concerns, summing up the 406-page budget as "expensive" and warning that the growing debt burden will hit taxpayers hard.

"Spending is up, debt is up, and debt interest charges are up," said Gage Haubrich, the CTF's Prairie Director. "It's a disaster for taxpayers because there was nowhere the government was actually looking to cut costs."

Haubrich said Ottawa missed an opportunity to streamline bureaucracy and reduce government spending, arguing that the new industrial carbon tax measures will further raise costs for families and businesses.

"We're looking at debt interest charges of about \$55.6 billion this year — more than what the government collects through GST," he said. "Every time Canadians pay sales tax, that money's not going toward services. It's going to pay for debt."

Haubrich added that Saskatchewan Premier Scott Moe's resistance to the federal carbon tax remains "the right call."

"He rightly pointed out that it hurts jobs and makes life more expensive for families," Haubrich said. "The last thing Ottawa should do is impose it again."

The federal government maintains that the new spending is an investment in national resilience. Officials argue that strengthening domestic industries will reduce vulnerability to trade disruptions, particularly after years of volatility in global markets.

Public Works Minister Joël Lightbound said the Buy Canadian policy "will give businesses — including small and medium-sized companies — opportunities to compete for major projects, grow, and create good jobs."

Proponents in the manufacturing and resource sectors have welcomed the policy as a way to boost local procurement and innovation, though many are waiting to see how quickly funds flow to communities.

Wagantall said the next phase — the Budget Implementation Act — will reveal which promises materialize. "There are statements about investments in agriculture and trade, but we need to see the details," she said. "Right now, it's still just words on paper."

For Saskatchewan, the budget includes modest funding for agriculture and infrastructure in the Prairies, but critics say the measures fall short of ad-

ressing inflation, carbon tax costs, and export challenges.

"We're resourceful people," Wagantall said. "Our farmers are innovating, our communities are adapting, but the federal government needs to open the economy, not just spend more borrowed money."

As Parliament prepares to debate the budget's implementation later this month, both supporters and skeptics agree on one thing: the stakes are high.

For Carney, Canada Strong is a test of his promise to shift the nation's economic foundation. For many Canadians, it may determine whether Ottawa's big bet on buying Canadian will pay off — or deepen the country's fiscal hole.

# Province introduces reforms to modernize Credit Union Act

The Saskatchewan government is moving to modernize its decades-old Credit Union Act, introducing amendments aimed at making it easier for credit unions to operate and better serve their members.

The proposed Credit Union Amendment Act, 2025, tabled in the legislature Nov. 5, would update and clarify portions of The Credit Union Act, 1998 to reflect how financial institutions now function in an increasingly digital and fast-changing economy.

"Saskatchewan credit unions are an integral part of Saskatchewan's economy," said Justice Minister and Attorney General Tim McLeod, K.C. "These amendments are meant to streamline and clarify requirements, making it easier for Saskatchewan credit unions to operate. This benefits both credit unions and consumers."

The changes include lowering the threshold for members to pass a special resolution from three-quarters to two-thirds — a move that aligns Saskatchewan with most other provinces. The amendments also authorize credit union boards

to delegate certain responsibilities to employees, define the term "professional adviser" for board eligibility, and clarify rules for deposit payouts, membership terminations and appeals.

Other updates will allow the use of electronic records and give regulators flexibility to prescribe future requirements through regulations.

According to McLeod, the goal is to simplify processes, reduce ambiguity, and ensure Saskatchewan's credit unions can remain competitive in an evolving financial landscape.

The sector has long advocated for an overhaul of the legislation, said Rob Swallow, director of communications and government relations with the Canadian Credit Union Association.

"It's actually fairly significant," Swallow told Grasslands News. "Credit unions have been advocating for quite some time for legislative changes to modernize the act — just to better reflect the current realities of credit unions and the communities they serve."

Swallow said one of the biggest updates involves formally recognizing the use of electronic records — something credit

unions have already been using for years.

"Having that modernization will help them in terms of records management," he said. "It's a step forward in strengthening Saskatchewan's credit unions and helping them keep pace with a changing landscape."

He added that the amendments stem from extensive consultation between government, regulators, and the industry. The Financial and Consumer Affairs Authority of Saskatchewan, the Ministry of Justice, the CCA, SaskCentral, and the Credit Union Deposit Guarantee Corporation all contributed feedback, along with Saskatchewan credit unions and the public.

"The government's been really good with consulting with credit unions," Swallow said. "We're really happy because they did take on quite a few of the suggestions that we had put forward. It demonstrates the strong alignment between the credit union sector and government."

Credit unions serve a major role in Saskatchewan's economy and remain a vital presence in rural and urban communities alike.

"There are 97 communities in Saskatchewan

that are only served by a credit union," Swallow said. "There are over 520,000 members — in a province of about 1.25 million — across 222 locations. So they're a major driver for the economy, not only for business, but for helping community members."

While the proposed changes won't significantly affect actions such as mergers, Swallow said one key adjustment — the lower threshold for passing special resolutions — will simplify governance

processes for all credit unions.

The bill is currently approaching second reading and is expected to return to the legislature in the spring session for further debate and potential passage. After that, the government will draft accompanying regulations, with additional consultation planned.

"We'll continue to engage with the government through that process to make sure everything lines up," Swallow said. "It's all good news for

credit unions — these are changes they've been asking for quite some time."

# Former premier finds faith and humour in the ashes of loss

Two months ago, former Saskatchewan Premier Lorne Calvert lost his house and everything in it when it was destroyed by fire.

Lost in the flames were treasures of a lifetime - not only in politics but as a United Church minister. But with a degree of hope and a sprinkling of light-hearted humour, Calvert told a men's luncheon at St. Andrew's Church in Fort Qu'Appelle how he was able to take the catastrophe in stride.

"The most frequent question I get is 'why did I give up the ministry for politics', and I replied 'when you spend your life dealing with sinners you might as well go where the action is,' he said to widespread laughter from the audience.

He then related a series of anecdotes from his extensive book of memories.

The first had to do with his cameo appearance on the popular television series Corner Gas. Calvert is remembered by many as the premier when a boom in commodity prices and resources increased provincial revenues. But a new generation who have no idea of who he was still recognize him from reruns of the show. He told of how the original script for the episode in which he

appears called for him to emerge from a shower. It was then rewritten to have him in bed with one of the show's female characters.

That never happened.

The scene with Calvert was filmed in the premier's office. For his participation in the television series, he was given a souvenir mug that was lost in the fire.

"That mug is gone," he said ruefully.

He then told of the role he played in getting Montreal promoter Donald K. Donald to convince the Rolling Stones to give two concerts at Taylor Field in Regina in 2006.

"I had my all-time favourite rock band there in front of me. They made more money in Regina than anywhere else," said Calvert. That's because they gave two concerts in Regina where they played to 80,000 fans.

The Stones autographed Calvert's guitar strap.

That too was lost in the rubble.

He then spoke of how Prince Charles - now the

King - took him completely off guard during a visit in 2007 by asking Calvert if he knew Percy Schmeiser, the former Member of the Legislature and organic farmer who made worldwide headlines in 2004 when he won a partial victory against Monsanto for accidentally contaminating his canola field with chemicals.

"I should have known at the time, but I didn't then that Prince Charles had a passion for organic farming," Calvert said. After the visit to Regina, Charles sent Calvert a personal letter in which he said he would see what he could do about sending his son, Prince Edward, out to Saskatchewan "as soon as possible."

The letter was reduced to ashes in the fire.

Those souvenirs, said Calvert, are now among the "inventory of memories that make us smile."

Then, compelling storyteller that Calvert is, he turned to the appropriate verse in scripture which admonishes us: "Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth.. for where you treasure is, there your heart will be also." (Matthew 6: 19-21)

"There is a lot of truth in that," said Calvert. "The memories that make you smile cannot be stolen, they can't be consumed, they can't be burned. Invest in the memories that make you smile."

## SHA begins posting daily updates on disruptions

As of Monday, Nov. 10, the Saskatchewan Health Authority (SHA) launched a new process to provide patients, families, and communities with accurate and reliable information about emergency room availability. All emergency service disruptions, regardless of their length, were being posted publicly on the SHA website, with updates occurring daily at 4 p.m., seven days a week.

The webpage, found at [saskhealthauthority.ca/servicedisruptions](http://saskhealthauthority.ca/servicedisruptions), listed all affected facilities alphabetically and provided direct links from the SHA Facilities & Locations directory to community-specific disruption notices.

When emergency room services were disrupted, signage was posted at the affected facility, and Healthline 811 provided real-time information. Patients and families were encouraged to call Healthline 811 toll-free, 24 hours a day, for advice regarding service availability or to access health guidance from Registered Nurses and other qualified health professionals.

The SHA also noted that work was underway to enhance the process by developing a longer-term, user-friendly public interface to support real-time updates.

In any life-threatening emergency, residents were reminded to call 9-1-1 immediately so paramedics could assess, treat, and transport patients to the nearest available site for medical attention.

# Province honours veterans at Sask. Legislative Building

In advance of Remembrance Day, a special service was held Nov. 5 at the Legislative Building to honour those who served. The rotunda area was filled with mostly MLAs and government representatives, including Her Honour Bernadette McIntyre, Saskatchewan's Lieutenant Governor.

"Remembrance Week is an important time for all of us here in Canada to recognize the service and the sacrifices of so many Canadians who - whether they were public servants, whether they were just in regular life - answer that call to service," said Col. Jason Quilliam, the province's Chief of Protocol and Secretary of the Saskatchewan Order of Merit. "Whether they went overseas, whether they served domestically, they put that uniform on, and so we take this week to recognize that."

This year's ceremonies marked the 80th anniversary of the end of World War II on Sept. 2, 1945.

"Those dates are not merely historical footnotes," he said. "They're solemn reminders of the cost of peace. They speak to a time when the world

was fractured by violence, and yet from that darkness, hope emerged, carried by those who served — many of whom never returned. It's our duty to ensure that their names, their stories, and their service are never forgotten."

Premier Scott Moe laid a wreath at the Saskatchewan War Memorial following the ceremony on Nov. 5, reflecting on the fragility of the peace we currently enjoy.

"I'm reminded of just how fortunate we are to have lived so long in our country without war at our doorstep," he said. "But we must be reminded that with the current geopolitical landscape that we see today, that this could change at any time."

In speaking with reporters after the wreath laying commenced, Col. Quilliam spoke on the good fortune to serve one's country in the military and through public service.

"Winston Churchill called reservists 'twice the citizen'," said Col. Quilliam, who wore the Canadian Armed Forces uniform for 28 years through regular service and as a reservist. "It's an interesting term, we're here in our communities. We're serving whether

we're public servants, whether we're corrections officers, whether we're teachers, but we're also taking that time out of our own schedules to wear the uniform. There's thousands of reservists in the West here who do that on a regular basis."

When asked by Grasslands News of his message to someone considering the Forces, Col. Quilliam was quick to call his nearly three decades in uniform as "the best decision that I've ever made."

"For me, it was continuing on a family legacy, but the lessons learned out of putting on a uniform, out of learning that discipline, about learning leadership, will hold anybody in great stead as they continue on in their own lives," he said. "It doesn't matter how old you are - whether you're 16, 17, whether you're 56, 57, - it doesn't matter your background. If you want to serve, I would encourage folks to talk to a recruiting officer, to go visit your local armoury, to go somewhere where there's a recruiting office and just check it out."

During his service, Col. Quilliam was on two tours in Afghanistan, one with the UN Peace Commission in Africa as a public ser-

vant, "fulfilling a lifelong goal of wearing a blue beret."

"Just over my shoulder here, there's 12,000 names etched of Saskatchewan-

alties of war dating back to 1885. "These are not just names on a monument. They were flesh and bone. They fought for all of our freedoms."

## When tragedy strikes close to home

When tragedy strikes in a small town, it doesn't just make the news — it breaks the collective heart of a community. The recent death of a man in Whitewood and the first-degree murder charge laid against a local youth has left residents shaken and searching for words. In a place where everyone is connected by only a few degrees of separation, the loss feels deeply personal, no matter who you are.

In big cities, such stories can fade into statistics. But here, we know the people behind the headlines. The victim may have been someone you waved to at the post office, someone your family worked with or helped. The accused may be a youth you've seen grow up — the child of parents who are friends, co-workers, or classmates. That's what makes tragedies like this so painfully real in small communities: everyone knows someone who is hurting, and the pain spreads far beyond a single home.

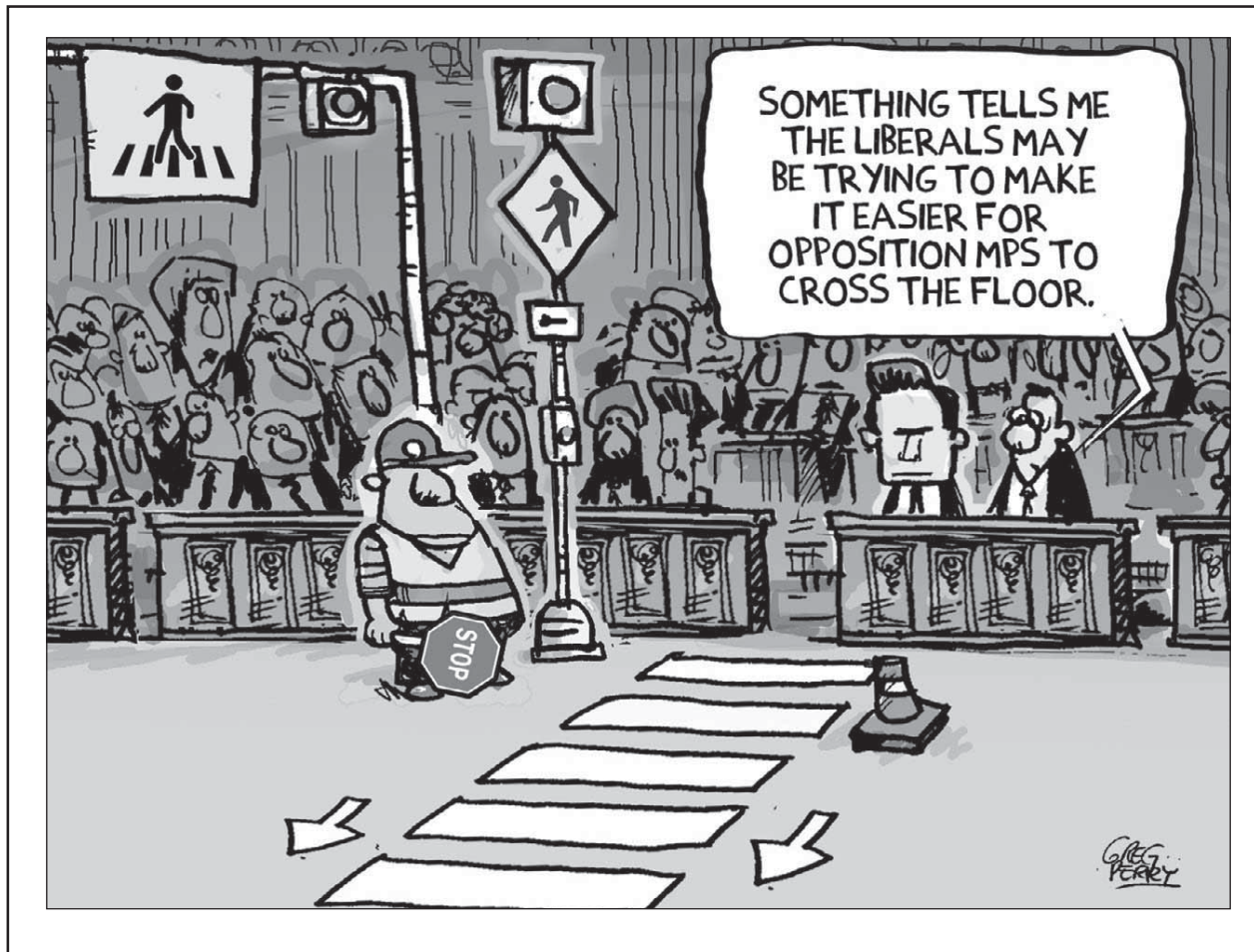
Both families now face long, difficult roads ahead — different, yet equally heavy. One family is grieving the unthinkable loss of a loved one. Their days ahead will be filled with sorrow, unanswered questions, and the slow process of trying to rebuild a life without someone who mattered deeply. The other family faces a different kind of heartbreak — knowing their child stands accused of taking a life. They must navigate the justice system, public scrutiny, and a future that has been forever altered. They, too, are mourning — mourning the loss of the life they once knew, the innocence of youth, and the dreams that have suddenly been shattered.

Both families will need compassion, privacy, and support from their community. Compassion for the pain that cannot be undone. Privacy to grieve and process without judgment. Support that extends beyond the first few days of shock — because this kind of trauma does not fade quickly. Over time, both will need the strength of friends, counsellors, faith leaders, and neighbours to help carry them through the weight of what has happened. Genuine gestures of care — a meal, a message, a moment of understanding — can mean more than words ever could.

And as we think about the human toll, we must also remember those who responded first: the RCMP officers, paramedics, and volunteer firefighters who were witness to the scene, did their jobs with professionalism and care, and then carried those images home with them. In small towns, first responders are not anonymous — they are our neighbours, our friends, sometimes even relatives of the people involved. They, too, will need time and support to heal from what they witnessed.

Tragedies like this test the very heart of a community. It is easy to let fear, gossip, or blame take root. But true strength comes from empathy — from choosing to care for everyone affected, without exception. Whitewood and the surrounding area have always been known for coming together in difficult times. Now, more than ever, that compassion will be needed to help both families, the first responders, and the entire community find a path forward through grief, shock, and pain.

## Bagpipes, rock and roll, and a record-breaking tribute

Bagpipes are classified as one of those things 'you either love em or hate em'. A hauntingly beautiful melody performed by an elegantly dressed piper can be interpreted as someone practicing torturous misdeeds upon a housecat (perhaps skill levels also factor in) to those not keen on the instrument.

But there is one unifying element most music enthusiasts can agree on — the bagpipe solo in AC/DC's 'Long Way to the Top if you Wanna Rock and Roll' is awesome.

A new world record was set recently with that particular tune, a nod to its 50-year anniversary of being scribed by the brothers Angus and Malcolm Young plus former frontman Bon Scott. The Aussie rockers officially released the song on Dec. 8, 1975, and gained perhaps the greatest notoriety for that particular tune with a 1976 video featuring the band navigating Melbourne's Swanston Street in a flatbed truck while performing with gear in tow. Bon Scott performed a bagpipe solo in the midst of the heavy rock classic, with the truck flanked by several pipers joining in the fun.

Talk about a publicity stunt for a rock band, not to mention the creation of an iconic music video! Anyway, back to the world record bit.

Nov. 12 saw 'the Great Melbourne Bagpipe Bash' in Federation Square, which is incidentally along the

famed Swanston Street that AC/DC rocked back in 1976. A mass of 374 pipers — the oldest aged 98 — gathered to perform 'It's a Long Way to the Top', joined by what reports claim were thousands of spectators cramming the space to get a glimpse. In that assortment of pipers were Les Kenfield and Kevin Conlon — two of the bagpipers that performed with AC/DC 49 years ago while filming the video.

The Australian Book of Records confirmed that the 374 pipers indeed shattered the previous record set in 2012 by a mere 333 Bulgarian pipers.

Today, only Angus Young remains as an original member of the band, who once famously told an in-

terviewer how retirement is not an option in AC/DC. Perhaps wielding a Gibson SG is the secret formula for youth as Young retains his energy and onstage antics at 70 years of age. The fact that he's a teetotaler unlike many in the rock'n'roll lifestyle probably helps, plus getting paid from doing something you love.

Regardless, the band has managed to create timeless melodies that unite generations of rock fans; maybe imparting some of that 'fountain of youth' vibe along the way. And they proved bagpipes have a place in rock music.

# Saskatchewan plans to use dirty coal as 'bridge' to nuclear power

Saskatchewan is hitching its future to continued coal-fired power generation while it transitions to nuclear energy — and wants the federal government to help pay for a huge, but unspecified, chunk of it.

The province's new strategy, published Oct. 20, formalized Saskatchewan Premier Scott Moe's intention to extend coal-fired power generation and use it as "a secure bridge" to nuclear power. The plan flies in the face of federal regulations that require all coal-fired power plants (except those outfitted with carbon capture technology) to be shut down by 2030 to clean up Canada's electricity grid.

"Coal is secure in that it's there, and it's operating, but the bridge to nuclear is the open question: How far is the bridge? How expensive? And what are the environmental consequences of maintaining that bridge?" M.V. Ramana, a professor and nuclear expert based at the University of British Columbia in Vancouver, said in an interview with Canada's National Observer.

Coal is the dirtiest fossil fuel and produces more planet-warming carbon dioxide when burned than oil or gas.

A group of citizens are challenging the province's decision to extend coal-fired generation, arguing the province's decision is "unreasonable" and should be reviewed by the courts due to a lack of public consultation, disregard for Canadian and international law and potential Charter rights implications. On Nov. 10, the applicants were in Court of King's Bench in Saskatoon to argue that the case should be allowed to proceed, while the province said it should be struck down.

Canada and Saskatchewan signed an equivalency agreement last winter that exempts Saskatchewan from the federal rules until the end of 2026, reads a statement from Gregory Frame, a spokesperson for Minister of Energy and Natural Resources Tim Hodgson, in an email to Canada's National Observer. The agreement recognizes "Saskatchewan has its own measures to achieve the same outcomes as federal coal regulations," Frame wrote.

Saskatchewan's energy security and supply plan does not include cost estimates for bringing small modular reactors online and large-scale reactors online but still asked the federal government to pay for 75 per cent of the province's first nuclear reactor.

The federal govern-

ment did not give a clear response to the province's request for it to cover three quarters of a reactor. The federal government is committed "to advancing clean, reliable baseload power in Saskatchewan and across Canada, including next-generation nuclear," according to Frame's statement. In it, Frame pointed to \$74 million the federal government committed in 2023 to support the pre-development work for Saskatchewan's first small modular reactor project with SaskPower and GE Hitachi.

The province's plan was light on details, but if Saskatchewan wants its first reactor to be a reproduction of Ontario's Darlington SMR project, which includes four reactors, the current cost would be \$20.9 billion — meaning the province would expect Ottawa to contribute \$15.7 billion, Ramana said.

"I don't see the federal government paying that kind of money," said Ramana. For Darlington, the federal government is spending \$2 billion through the Canada Growth Fund and several years ago provided nearly \$1 billion through the Canada Infrastructure Bank for pre-development work.

"The rest of the costs, I presume, are going to be falling upon the heads of the residents," Ramana said.

"Now, in the case of Saskatchewan ... regardless of whether this is realistic or not, the question is, even after that, what is the cost increase that is going to be passed on to the customers, as opposed to if the province had chosen to go with an expansion of wind and solar," he said.

Although the federal government and Saskatchewan are both supportive of nuclear energy,

Ottawa wants to replace fossil fuels — and fast, Ramana said.

"If Saskatchewan were really serious about nuclear, they should have started planning for these, for these reactors, decades ago," Ramana said. "Saskatchewan is so late to the game that it can only be seen as a delaying tactic."

"Even provinces that have been planning for close to a decade have not actually come anywhere close to having SMRs start operating," he said, pointing to New Brunswick as a "cautionary tale." Since 2018, the Atlantic province and federal government have given more than \$80 million to companies, ARC and Moltex, but neither will have a reactor ready by 2030.

Saskatchewan's energy security plan partially justifies its decision to stick with coal-fired generation because of the intermittent nature of wind and solar power, citing SaskPower's forecast that electricity demand will increase by 40 to 100 per cent by 2050.

"Countries around the world have been adopting renewables, and they've been growing very fast, despite the fact that everywhere wind and solar have fairly low efficiencies, but it's more than compensated for by the fact that their costs are far less," Ramana said. Once you set up wind turbines or solar panels, you generate electricity for free because you aren't paying for fuel like with nuclear, he said.

Over the last decade, ways to deal with the variability of renewables "have increased tremendously," including through expansion of storage, battery storage and demand-side measures, making it a more logical path, particularly when compared to the long timelines and high costs of nuclear, Ramana said.

Saskatchewan would continue burning coal until it gets SMRs online and contributing to the electricity grid, which Ramana said could be 2035 in a very optimistic scenario, but likely closer to 2040.

The province should be investing in and researching how to integrate more renewables onto Saskatchewan's grid while maintaining grid stability, he said. But by doubling down on coal, the province is signalling disinterest in solving those challenges, said Ramana.

Federal regulations require all coal-fired power plants (except those with carbon capture technology) be shut down by 2030 to clean up Canada's electricity grid but Saskatchewan's plan doesn't emphasize carbon capture for coal plants.

Jesse Knisley, media relations officer for Saskatchewan's executive council, said in an email to Canada's National Observer that SaskEnergy is not currently pursuing a carbon capture project. The Crown utility is open to explore a role in transporting and storing carbon dioxide if such a project is developed in Saskatchewan, Knisley said.

Ontario was the first province to phase out coal-fired electricity under Premier Kathleen Wynne in 2014. Last summer, Alberta transitioned its last coal plant to natural gas to complete the coal phase-out. New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Saskatchewan still use coal-fired electricity.

Saskatchewan is the world's second-largest producer of uranium and Saskatoon-based Cameco Corp and Brookfield Asset Management recently struck up an \$80 billion strategic partnership with the U.S. government to accelerate nuclear deployment south of the border.

# Taxpayers have a right to see the costs of Ottawa's gun ban and confiscation

If you walk into a car dealership to ask about the price of the car out front and answer is "probably tens-of-thousands of dollars," it's unlikely you are going to buy that car.

Consumers need the full information on the price of something before they can decide if it's a good decision. The same goes for taxpayers and proposed government programs.

Since 2020, the federal government has banned more than 2,500 makes and models of firearms owned by licensed Canadians. Now, the federal government is pushing ahead with its gun confiscation scheme for individual firearms owners. Starting with a six-week pilot project in Cape Breton, Nova Scotia.

But the federal government has been anything but clear on the full price of its gun ban and confiscation scheme.

The Canadian Taxpayers Federation filed an access-to-information request with the RCMP for all projected costs to confiscate firearms in July 2023. The government answered this request in January 2024.

The request showed a letter from the Pacific Region RCMP showing that it would cost \$12.6 million to confiscate and destroy banned firearms in that region.

But the government refused to provide documents with cost estimates from other RCMP divisions.

The CTF then made a complaint to the information commissioner, the independent official whose job it is to make sure the government is being transparent, in April 2024. Now more than a year later, the complaint has essentially gone nowhere, multiple investigators have been assigned, but we still have no idea on when we will actually get an answer from the commissioner.

To go back to the car dealership, imagine asking about the price of a car and getting the answer: "I'll think about telling you in two to three years." That still isn't helpful to decide whether to buy the car.

That's why it's so important that taxpayers have timely and easy access to information on how much the government thinks programs like the gun confiscation will cost.

Access-to-information has been found to be quasi-constitutional, as access to government information is a necessary component for the meaningful exercise of freedom of expression. Without timely access to these types of documents, taxpayers are having their ability to exercise their fundamental freedom of expression limited by the government.

This problem is compounded because estimates the government have produced on the program so far have been wide ranging, lacking detail and not at all helpful for taxpayers trying to decide if the cost is worth it.

Originally the government said the confiscation would cost \$200 million in 2019. Then the Parliamentary Budget Officer said it will cost up to \$756 million compensate owners for their firearms without even considering administration costs. Other experts have put the final price tag at about \$6 billion.

The stats and the experts say the confiscation isn't worth it.

The union representing RCMP members says Ottawa's program "diverts extremely important personnel, resources, and funding away from addressing the more immediate and growing threat of criminal use of illegal firearms."

"It won't impact crime rates," said Mount Royal University professor Doug King. "Individuals who have registered firearms are much less likely to commit criminal offences than people who don't have firearms."

That makes it even more important for taxpayers to know the full price of the scheme.

That's why the CTF is going to court to compel the information commissioner to do its job and issue a decision on the CTF's complaint and release the information.

Ottawa should not be hiding the full picture of costs from taxpayers for any program and this court fight will enforce the transparency taxpayers deserve.

# Court orders return of nearly \$500K stolen from RM of Edenwold in email fraud scheme

Details leading to the decision of a King's Bench Court case involving the fraudulent transfer of funds from the RM of Edenwold have been made public, highlighting how such online crimes seem to be on the rise.

In a decision issued Oct. 23, Justice A.S. Davis ruled that the RM of Edenwold No. 158 is the rightful owner of \$497,613.28 that was mistakenly transferred to a fraudulent account earlier this year. The court found that the funds were sent under a "mistake of fact," after municipal officials were deceived by convincing—but ultimately fake—email messages that appeared to come from a legitimate partner organization.

According to court documents, the RM believed it was transferring the money to the White City–Emerald Park Wastewater Management Authority, with which it had an ongoing business relationship. Instead, the payment went to an unknown fraudster who had hacked the authority's email account.

"The RM transferred funds in response to an email communication from a WCRM account," Justice Davis wrote. "That account had been hacked and the request for the e-transfer came, not from the WCRM, but from an unknown fraudulent actor."

While Davis described the RM's

actions as "somewhat surprising," given that the email messages were "a departure from previous practice" and written in "ungrammatical English," he said the facts were clear: the money was never meant for the person or persons who received it.

The decision follows similar cases in which public bodies and businesses have been duped into transferring funds to cyber criminals through fake invoices or spoofed email addresses. Justice Davis referenced *Creative Saskatchewan v. Royal Bank of Canada* (2023), where a provincial Crown corporation was also tricked into sending funds to an imposter. That case resulted in a comparable order directing the bank to disclose information and return the money.

"The ease with which moneys may be transferred electronically and the sophistication of fraudulent actors suggests schemes like the one here may only grow more prevalent," Davis noted.

The RM's legal counsel, Randall Sandbeck, K.C., argued successfully that the municipality was entitled to the return of its money under well-established common law principles: if someone pays another under a mistaken belief, the payer is typically entitled to reclaim it unless the recipient can show valid reason to keep it. In this case, no such reason existed.

Although the Bank of Montreal

did not oppose the application, it required a court order before releasing any funds or customer information, due to privacy laws. Justice Davis ordered that the money currently held by BMO be returned to the RM and that the bank disclose the name and details of the individual or entity controlling the fraudulent account.

The judge cited provisions under the Personal Information Protection and Electronic Documents Act which allow banks to share otherwise confidential information when required by a court order. He emphasized that such disclosure "will not interfere with BMO's obligations" under federal privacy law.

The RM had also requested a broader order, known as a Norwich order, that would have compelled any financial or investment institution aware of the transaction to release related information. Justice Davis declined to extend the order that far, limiting it to BMO only.

"I am reluctant to order a non-party who has had no ability to make representations to this Court to do anything," he wrote, cautioning that the proposed sweeping order could affect institutions that had not been notified or given a chance to respond.

However, Davis agreed to remain "seized" of the case, meaning he will continue to oversee it if the RM later learns that the stolen funds were transferred to other banks or accounts. This would allow the municipality to apply more efficiently for additional disclosure orders in the future.

The ruling serves as a cautionary tale for municipalities and organizations across Saskatchewan that handle large electronic transactions. In his written decision, Davis acknowledged the sophistication of such schemes and said courts are increasingly being asked to assist victims in tracing and recovering lost funds.

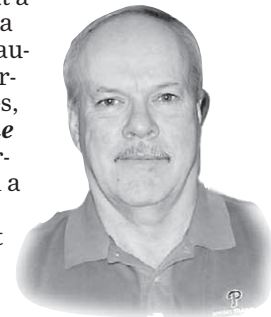
"This kind of fraud is a scourge on our businesses and economy," he wrote, quoting from the *Creative Saskatchewan* case. "The order sought is necessary to allow the RM to trace and hopefully recover more of its property."

Of the initial \$497,613.28 transferred, the RM was able to recover \$377,376.03 of the funds.

The restaurant said simply that they have "taken the appropriate action concerning the subject employee." Randy Cassingham warned, "Wear gloves: rats can carry disease."



After watching her daughter graduate from high school, Maria Mendoza stopped at a Burger King in Dacula, Ga., and noticed another **graduate working the counter**, still wearing his Honors medals. He wasn't scheduled for a shift that night, but stepped in to help overwhelmed co-workers. "He was so kind, so polite," she said of Mykale Baker. "While many graduates spent the night celebrating with friends and family, he quietly showed the world what determination looks like."

Mendoza started a GoFundMe account, hoping to raise \$60,000. The last time I checked, the **fund had raised \$236,876 USD** and Mykale had started classes at Gwinnett Tech for Automotive, pursuing his dream of becoming a master auto mechanic. BK also gave a 10K scholarship.

A driver of a Lamborghini Huracán, a 34-year-old North Vancouver man, is facing a slew of fines after being caught travelling over twice the speed limit on Highway 99 in Porteau Cove. That vehicle retails for upwards of \$300,000 in Canada. A secondary charge was levied for not having snow tires. **Winter tires are required** on most BC highways from Oct. 1 until at least March 31. "Those rules also apply to supercars," said a police statement.

Taking a Pounding: America has its dollar stores. The UK has its own version, Poundland. Even though a pound is currently worth US\$1.33, the 1/3 premium isn't keeping the discount retailer on its feet. **A bidding war has ensued** among multiple suitors, and it appears Gordon Brothers, an American company known for snapping up distressed companies, is the front-runner. It will take on debts and the costs of turning Poundland around, and thus the actual price it will pay for the company is going to be rather low: about a pound. Randy Cassingham pointed out, "Don't forget: bags are extra."

This is True reported that US Customs and Border Protection officers at Florida's Tampa International Airport say an arriving passenger **declared "10 cigars"** in his luggage, **but didn't mention several other items**, including "prohibited plants," a human skull, and several other bones wrapped in foil. "The traveler claimed the items were for rituals," said CBP Director of Field Operations Carlos C. Martel. Due to potential health risks, the undeclared items were seized and destroyed. Homeland Security says an investigation continues.

The Alexandria (Va.) Redevelopment and Housing Authority Board discovered that an executive with a six-figure salary had been **allowed to jump to the top of a waiting list of "thousands of people"** to live in one of the agency's "affordable housing" units, advertised as "the best type of unit that ARHA has to offer." And who did Johnson allow to live in such a high-end, subsidized place when there were so many in line for the location? Himself. The irony? "Being unemployed now makes him eligible to live there."

President Donald **Trump attacked ranchers** after they pushed back on his plan to import beef from Argentina to help ease record prices for beef. That plan never made much sense to me in a country trying to be great, all on its own. The National Cattlemen's Beef Association, the Ranchers-Cattlemen Action Legal Fund United Stockgrowers of America and other farming groups condemned the president's casual remark about importing beef from Argentina, and Trump lashed out at them. How? Oh, on a Truth Social post. "The Cattle Ranchers, who I love, don't understand that the only reason they are doing so well, for the first time in decades, is **because I put tariffs on cattle coming into the United States**, including a 50 per cent tariff on Brazil," posted Trump, who suggested ranchers were insufficiently grateful and blamed them for higher prices for consumers.

# Ochapawace FN man accused of murder back in court Nov. 19

After a recent appearance in Broadview Provincial Court, Dustyn Allary, 33, will have his matter heard on Wednesday Nov. 19. Allary is from the Ochapawace First Nation and is being charged with second-degree murder in relation to the death of 32-year-old Elias Still, also of OFN.

Around 6:45 a.m. on April 20, 2024, Broadview RCMP were called to a residence to assist EMS with an injured male who later died on

scene; identified as Still. Police immediately considered the death as suspicious with RCMP Major Crimes taking charge of the investigation.

Allary was arrested at the scene and initially appeared in Yorkton Provincial Court two days after Still's death. After appearing in Broadview Provincial Court on Aug. 6, 2025, Allary was released on \$5,000 bail and continued appearances throughout the summer.

Still is remembered for his positive attitude and sense of humour; always willing to help those around him.

# Sask's waterfowl population strong despite challenges

Three years ago, the provincial government of Saskatchewan introduced new legislation involving a revised Trespass Law. As of January that year, hunters were required to obtain direct permission to hunt on private land.

Katherine Conkin, a wildlife biologist based in Saskatoon for the Saskatchewan Fish and Wildlife branch of the Ministry of the Environment, was recently asked about the impact of this law on the population of waterfowl, as well as other changes that may affect the growth of these bird species in Saskatchewan. Given that the province is located on the main migratory route, Conkin noted that "the waterfowl population continues to do very well in Saskatchewan, though we continue to monitor as we go through drought periods."

Recent notable waterfowl migrations spotted in the Southwest include snow geese. When asked about their status, Conkin replied, "In the early 2000s, snow geese and Ross's geese exploded and they were doing incredibly well." However,

she also mentioned that recent snow geese populations are seeing a decline due to breeding productivity.

When asked about the Canadian goose, the signature bird of Canada, Conkin stated, "They're doing pretty well, with nothing notable to report in Saskatchewan."

While the current situation for some waterfowl has remained the same, a

look at the past provides insight into the future. Out-of-province hunters, including Americans, saw a dramatic decrease during the COVID-19 pandemic. "For at least a year, we didn't have any hunters coming in or out of the province, or very few, and there was a steep decline," stated Conkin. "More recently, we've seen the number of hunters return to pre-COVID levels, and it's kind of stabilized."

Conkin went on to state, "I was just looking at the number of non-resident license sales for this year, and most visiting hunters are visiting from late September to early mid-October, and we're within 100 licenses of last year's numbers."

When asked about the impact of the changes to the Trespass Law and its effect on hunting, Conkin responded by saying, "It's a complex question. I don't know if we've seen a change in population that we can directly relate to the law. We did some research on waterfowl hunters, both resident and non-resident, just after the change to the Trespass law, and it generally indicated that it didn't have a significant impact on people's ability to obtain permission. But that's not to say there aren't pockets where people are struggling to get permission."

The biologist noted that other types of hunting have shown more significant signs of difficulty. "With big game, we've had a lot more response from people who are having difficulty getting access to hunt for a variety of reasons," said Conkin. "This is something we're certainly interested in and watching more closely as a ministry."

# ER closures in local rural communities highlight ongoing rural healthcare crisis

Rural residents in Broadview, Wolseley, and Kipling are facing mounting frustration as all three communities continue to grapple with emergency room closures amid what many are calling one of the most severe rural healthcare crises Saskatchewan has seen in years.

According to the Saskatchewan Health Authority's new daily reporting system, emergency rooms in Broadview and Wolseley were among 10 rural facilities listed as closed this week. Kipling's emergency department, meanwhile, has been shuttered since Friday with no timeline announced for reopening.

The ongoing closures have drawn criticism from the Saskatchewan

NDP, who say the provincial government has failed to deliver on promises to stabilize rural healthcare services. "This public reporting of emergency room closures confirms what we've known for years — the Sask. Party is failing rural Saskatchewan," said Keith Jorgenson, NDP Associate Shadow Health Minister. "Reporting is one thing. Actually fixing rural healthcare is a whole different matter."

For residents across the southeast, the impact has been significant. With Broadview, Wolseley, and Kipling all facing interruptions, patients requiring urgent care are increasingly being redirected to facilities in Indian Head, Moosomin, or even Regina — adding crucial travel time during emergencies. Local leaders have repeatedly warned that chronic staffing shortages and burnout among healthcare workers are leaving small-town hospitals unable to maintain consistent service.

The Sask. Party government began publicly posting ER closure information this week after months of public and political pressure. While the

move is being welcomed as a step toward transparency, critics say it does little to address the underlying problem: the lack of doctors, nurses, and paramedics willing to work in rural areas.

The NDP says it is developing a comprehensive plan to restore access to healthcare through its Your Care, Your Say initiative, encouraging residents of Broadview, Wolseley, Kipling, and other affected communities to share their experiences and help shape future solutions.

# Saskatchewan sees strong job growth

Saskatchewan's job market continues to show resilience, with new data from Statistics Canada revealing that the province added 14,000 jobs over the past year, marking a 2.3 per cent increase — the second-highest growth rate among Canadian provinces. The unemployment rate dropped to 5.5 per cent in October, well below the national aver-

age of 6.9 per cent.

"Saskatchewan continues to have one of the lowest unemployment rates in Canada as our economy creates more jobs and opportunities in the province," said Deputy Premier and Minister of Immigration and Career Training Jim Reiter. "Our government is here to support a strong labour force to fill the jobs being created, so Saskatchewan continues to be the best place to live, work and raise a family."

Employment in Sas-

katchewan reached record highs for October, with 621,800 people working and a total labour force of 651,200. Full-time employment accounted for 514,500 positions, up 12,600 from the previous year — an increase of 2.5 per cent.

Both of the province's largest cities also saw notable gains. Regina's employment rose by 9,200 jobs (6.4 per cent), while Saskatoon added 1,900 positions (0.9 per cent) compared to October 2024.

Sector-specific increases were led by health

care and social assistance, which grew by 7,300 jobs (7.6 per cent), and construction, which added 4,400 positions (9.6 per cent).

Beyond employment, Saskatchewan continues to post strong economic indicators. The province's real GDP grew by 3.1 per cent in 2024, reaching \$83.6 billion — the second-highest rate of growth in Canada. Saskatchewan also led all provinces in month-over-month growth for building construction investment in August 2025.

## Strategic Planning

At its meeting on Oct. 27, council agreed to engage a consultant for strategic planning services. Administration informed council that the consultant has accepted employment elsewhere and can no longer provide the service. Council rescinded its motion from the previous meeting and will explore alternative service provider options.

## Office Proposal

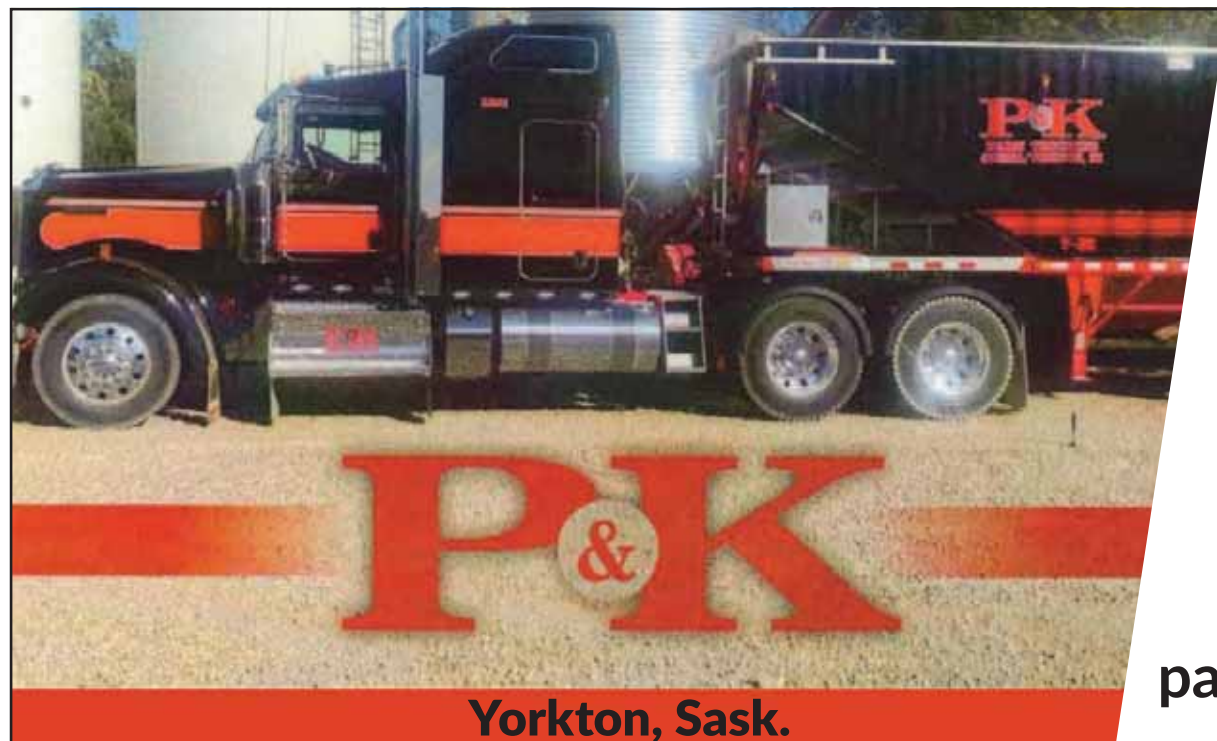
Over the past few years, the town has noted an impending need for expanded office space. Council reviewed possible concept plans for an addition to the back of the existing Town Office and Library

building. The plans could accommodate four additional offices, along with a council chambers and another meeting room.

Council is still gathering information before proceeding with specific plans and directed administration to obtain pricing estimates based on the concepts presented. This information will be considered when council discusses the municipal budget for next year and prepares to renew its 5-year Capital Works Plan.

## Grant Application

The town's raw water supply line is nearing the end of its useful life and replacement costs are estimated at \$3.17 million. Council approved a motion to apply for a Canada Housing Infrastructure Fund grant to help finance the project. If approved, the grant would include a 40 per cent federal contribution and a 33 per cent provincial contribution.

# Homeschoolers learn about Saskatchewan soldiers

A special presentation at Grenfell Library last Friday provided homeschooled children with insight to Saskatchewan soldiers' role in World War II.

## Homeschool Meetings

With a growing number of families in the area choosing to homeschool their children, the board and librarian in Grenfell recognized an opportunity to host programming for this demographic. This fall, "Homeschoolers Unite" began meeting on the first and third Friday of each month. Several families from Grenfell and neighbouring communities join together on these afternoons for social and educational activities. The session on Nov. 7 focused on the theme of Remembrance Day and included a presentation by Greg Salmers, an honorary life member of the South Saskatchewan Regiment Association.

## Website Creation

Salmers explained that he was born eleven years after WWII ended and eventually served for eight years with the Canadian army as an armoured reconnaissance officer. However, his involvement with the South Saskatchewan Regiment stemmed from a library project. Salmers worked as a librarian in Estevan and one of his responsibilities was to digitize history books from Saskatchewan communities. After he completed this process for about 20 local history books that were published in the 1980s, he also digitized a book compiled by Lt. Col. G.B. Buchanan called "The March of the Prairie Men". It presents the history of the South Saskatchewan Regiment (SSR) as recorded in Buchanan's war diary and other documents. Salmers noted that there was a tremendous response to the book being made available online.

"Right away people started sending in comments like, 'I saw my dad listed there and here's a picture of him,'" Salmers explained.

As soldiers and their families submitted additional documents and information, Salmers used his technical skills to

digitize them. Regiment members Capt. Cecil Law and Sgt. P.T. Maule contributed content and assisted Salmers in compiling and organizing the information. Soon, the online version of "The March of the Prairie Men" had become the seed for an independent regimental website accessible at [www.southsaskatchewanregiment.ca](http://www.southsaskatchewanregiment.ca).

Those affiliated with the regiment were grateful to Salmers for his efforts to preserve their history as webmaster of the SSR site. So, they made him an honorary life member of the South Saskatchewan Regiment Association.

## Relatable History

As he learned more about the SSR's movements during World War II, Salmers noted with particular interest that he was familiar with locations where the soldiers had been in the Netherlands. As a young man, Salmers participated in an agricultural exchange program and lived with a farming family near the former Westerbork camp that was liberated by Canadian forces in 1945 and where Anne Frank had been prisoner for a time.

When he spoke with homeschool families at Grenfell Library last week, Salmers showed them many documents and artifacts relating to the regiment's experience during WWII. This included a drawing of the Westerbork camp, books about Anne Frank and photographs of Saskatchewan soldiers. Children were eager to handle a distinctive badge worn by members of the regiment and turn the pages of a songbook that a soldier may have carried with him during the war. They were intrigued by Pte. Mike Selinger's suitcase that contained his personal effects from the war, too. Salmers showed the children a map of Europe and indicated where the regiment fought. He described the Battle of Dieppe and showed the group a picture of the HMS Princess Beatrix that transported the Saskatchewan soldiers to battle in France.

Salmers also explained how to navigate the SSR website in order to find a family member's name in the Nominal Roll, or view photographs and news articles about the regiment. He demonstrated how to peruse the war diary to

read a firsthand record of the regiment's activities. He explained that the section under the "Soldiers" tab displays content provided by soldiers and their families.

"The 'Soldiers' section has 130 veterans in it and those are all veterans that voluntarily contributed content. All the veterans are gone now, but while they were living, they would send in photos or love letters," Salmers said. "I'm most proud of that because it's interaction with families and its soldiers presenting what they feel is important. I tried to present what that person's life was like before they enlisted, while they were in uniform and after they came home. There's really rich detail in there."

## Preserving Family Stories

Salmers emphasized that contribu-

tions are still accepted for the website. Family members are encouraged to share letters, photos or stories about soldiers who were part of the SSR. These can be digitized and added to the online archive, preserving history for the family and others who may be interested to learn about the regiment.

"If you have a relative who was in the South Saskatchewan Regiment, I will work with you to make an area to honour them. It's authentic history," Salmers commented. "It's a way to preserve and present the content for their family member, and it's a way to honour their family member, too."

responders across the province," Perchie noted, stating that's between SEHO and the unions. Until that gap starts getting bridged, he said they will continue to see this, adding that pay parity and benefits are key to long-term stability.

Despite the challenges, Whitewood remains in a relatively stronger position compared to many rural communities. The town's ambulance operates on 12-hour shifts (same as full-time fire services)—considered the "gold standard" in the industry as many services work on eight-hour shifts and standby—and benefits from dedicated living quarters for paramedics on duty. The majority of the paramedics don't live in Whitewood. "If we didn't have the house, we wouldn't be staffed at all," Antal explained. "Those

three things—good pay, 12-hour shifts, and a place to stay—are what stabilize rural EMS."

Currently, Whitewood has four full-time paramedic positions but only one is filled. Two staff members are away attending paramedic school, and another accepted a temporary post elsewhere. However, SHA officials announced that a new paramedic has been recruited and will begin work in mid-November. Additional casual staff from Indian Head and Esterhazy are also being brought in to help fill shifts.

Perchie stated he is responsible for 38 ambulance services throughout Southern Saskatchewan and a good chunk of those are on-call services. "So, we've been working with the government for the last four years on stabilizing rural EMS. We're trying to move those services to eight hours on and 16 on-call. So even that is not as good as what we have (in Whitewood), because we've got 12 and 12."

Continuing to explain that Regina loses all kinds of staff to the fire department, Perchie added, "And so once you're in with the SHA, you have seniority, and a position opens up in Regina, and

you've got it. And that's a challenge for us. The best practice that we see is when we can grow local people from the community, right?"

The SHA is exploring innovative approaches to address staffing gaps, including hiring graduates on "restricted licenses" that opens up staff that can drive the ambulance and work alongside their partner but cannot be alone in the back of a unit with a patient until they complete the national certification exams, which are only offered twice a year. They are offering bursaries to attract rural recruits. Emergency medical responders from local communities are also being trained through a short in-house program, though that option will soon become less feasible when course requirements increase next year.

To encourage more rural participation, SHA has launched a \$10,000 bursary for new paramedic trainees who commit to working in smaller centres for at least two years—double the amount of the bursary amount offered in Regina and Saskatoon. Local leaders suggested that the SHA should be promoting the bursary through town channels and schools to

reach potential candidates.

While recruitment remains the immediate priority, officials emphasized that retention is equally critical. "We need something for those who've stayed and built careers here," one said. "A \$10,000 bursary is great for new people, but it doesn't help the ones who've been carrying the load for years."

"Our goal, we call it assembled crew - where there's a station with an ambulance," Perchie added. "The goal is on a hot call, they gotta be in the bus, say ready to go in one minute. If it's not an assembled crew, it's 10 to

15; 10 minutes is the goal but sits around 12 or 13. That's a big difference for a medical, like in a medical emergency."

Ideally the ambulance and the staff will be in the same building. "I think the ministry knows pretty clearly now the three things that we're looking for. And we have multiple business cases in for funding to try, and I don't care if we lease or what we do, but something that's got a decent facility for people that's co-located with an ambulance," Antal stated but also commented, "Until we get more into the system to actually get it stabilized, this is what

it's going to be like for a while. I get a lot of pressure, fix it, fix it, but you know what? We want to move the bar."

Both the SHA and the Town of Whitewood agreed to keep communication open and to explore ways municipalities can help advocate for stronger support through organizations like SUMA. "We're doing everything we can to move the bar," Perchie concluded. "Whitewood is fortunate to have what it does—but the reality is, we're still only one sprained ankle away from being down an ambulance."



## Paramedic shortage

A shortage of paramedics in Saskatchewan has put emergency services at one of the worst positions it has been in in recent memory. Wages, hours and competition with fire departments is draining ambulance services of staff.

# Grenfell Fire callout fee jumps \$300; council approves rate

Grenfell town council held a regular meeting in the Lilac Room at 6:30 p.m. on Nov. 6.

Council reviewed correspondence which included minutes from a Southeast Transportation Planning Committee meeting held in September. Councillor Kim Lemieux asked Councillor Dwayne Stone, who regularly attends SETPC meetings, for an update on a potential acceleration lane for Highway 1 at the intersection with Highway 47. Stone confirmed that the recommendation had been presented to SETPC and a traffic count was to be completed and submitted for evaluation.

Grenfell Athletic Association submitted a request that the town donate a season pass for the golf course and a season pass for the swimming pool to be included in the GAA Casino Night on Nov. 26 and 27. Council agreed to support the GAA fundraiser by donating both passes.

Council discussed the upcoming community Remembrance Day service. Mayor Mark Steininger volunteered to place a wreath on behalf of the town during the ceremony.

Council reviewed a Bylaw to Recover Protective Services charges with updated rates for fire department services.

“We haven’t raised rates for four years and

a lot of our supplies have almost doubled in price,” explained Councillor and Fire Chief Stone.

The new bylaw increased the fee for fire truck callouts from \$600 to \$900 per hour. The expense for firefighting foam also increased notably from \$150 per 20-litre pail to \$450. Personnel rates rose from \$25 to \$30 per hour for each firefighter and the additional \$5 will be allocated to a fund to support equipment purchases. Stone noted that anyone billed for these costs can typically recoup the expense through an insurance claim.

Rates for attending a false alarm also increased. The first incident is free of charge, but second false alarm calls will be

charged \$350, third and subsequent calls will be charged \$500. Stone noted that false alarms are most often triggered by a security system that automatically notifies the fire department. He advises property owners to consult their security system provider to remedy this problem.

After reviewing the document, council unanimously approved the three readings required to bring the new rates into effect.

Another bylaw that outlines the scope of services provided by the fire department and parties’ responsibilities for payment is also being updated and will be presented to council when revisions are completed.

# Comedy night in Grenfell supports local Curling Club

Kardash noted that it is a CurlSask sanctioned event and said that fire departments from neighbouring communities have already expressed interest in attending.

Curling for the 2025-2026 season is expected to start in Grenfell later this month. Facility preparations are in progress, with ice making set to begin this week so that curling can start during the last week in November. Drop-in doubles curling is scheduled for Tuesday evenings and regular league play will take place on Thursdays. A kids’ curling program was organized last year and was well-received so it will resume this season. Youth will have ice time early on Thursday evenings, before league play. In the New Year, a Ladies Bonspiel is planned for January with an Open Bonspiel to follow in mid-February. There will likely be a Kids’ Funspiel in conjunction with the youth program as well.

# Moe proclaims 'Green and White Day'

Ahead of Riders' playoff clash

Saskatchewan Premier Scott Moe was joined by a pair of familiar faces at the legislature Thursday morning — Roughriders' president and CEO Craig Reynolds and the team's furry green mascot, Gainer the Gopher — to officially declare Friday, Nov. 7, as 'Green and White Day' across the province.

"It is time to paint the province green and white! Gainer's got his fur brushed up, his jersey ready and he cannot wait to see Rider Nation showing their colours loud and proud," Gainer said according to Craig Reynolds.

The proclamation came as the Saskatchewan Roughriders prepared to host the BC Lions in the CFL's Western Final at Mosaic Stadium in Regina on Saturday, Nov. 8.

"Tomorrow is officially 'Green and White Day' in the province of Saskatchewan," Moe announced, holding up the freshly signed proclamation beside Gainer, who theatrically added his signature in green marker. "We're proclaiming not only the day, but a victory on Saturday as well."

The premier said the declaration is a way for Saskatchewan residents to unite behind the team and celebrate a season that has brought "a lot of excitement and pride" to the province.

"We're encouraging everybody to wear their green and white tomorrow in support of our beloved Roughriders," Moe said. "It's been such an exciting year for the Riders, with so much good news to share."

Among that good news: the team will host the 2027 Grey Cup in Regina, a decision Moe called "a major win for the city and for Saskatchewan fans everywhere." The premier also highlighted new initiatives such as the approval of tailgating at Rider games next season, something he said will "elevate the fan experience

even higher."

With so many fans globally backing the Green Machine, those associated with the team certainly feel the love.

"Rider Nation's support means everything to our players, coaches and staff as we head into the Western Final," Reynolds said. "We are proud to have the Government of Saskatchewan and fans across the province behind us for this 'Green and White Day'."

The premier was quick to credit the organization for its stability and leadership, especially through recent years that have been challenging for many professional sports leagues.

"The CFL is very strong today, thankfully to the leadership of all of the organizations that are part of that league," Moe said. "The spirit of Rider Pride is very strong and Saskatchewan people are

ready to support their team this weekend and certainly support our beloved Rough Riders into next season."

Asked to interpret for Gainer, who remained silent but expressive through the announcement, Moe said the mascot wanted fans to know that "it takes the most beloved mascot in the CFL to bring a little fun to the legislature and remind everyone to cheer for the O&D lines — because that's where the game will be won."

The premier dodged a request for a precise score prediction for Sunday's game, offering only, "We'll have more than them. That's what matters."

Moe confirmed he plans to attend the Grey Cup should the Riders advance to Winnipeg and hinted that another 'Green and White Day' might be declared for the occasion.

He also joked that Gainer might have political aspirations after his trip to the legislature, when asked by Grasslands News.

"He did talk to his MLA," Moe quipped. "He said he might consider running — probably federally. He thinks Ottawa could use a little more Saskatchewan representation, and a great way for him to launch that would be to win the Grey Cup two or three times, bring that to Ottawa and show them what Saskatchewan folks are really made of."

Moe said the Riders' success has had a broad impact beyond the gridiron, boosting morale and strengthening community spirit throughout the province.

"The Roughriders aren't just a football team — they're part of our culture," he said. "They bring people together in small towns and big cities, across generations. When the Riders win, Saskatchewan feels a little brighter."

As the province prepares for Friday's sea of green and white, Moe said he expects Saskatchewan's trademark football passion to be on full display this weekend.

"All 1,250,000 of us come out and show our support for that team, show our support for what we know they can do on the field," he said. "And that's what we're hoping to do this weekend and certainly do a repeat next weekend."

After speaking with the media, Premier Moe and Gainer raised the Roughriders' flag at the Legislature Building in celebration.

The Riders finished the regular season with a 12-6 record, clinching top position in the CFL West. As for that big Western Final matchup, nobody in Riderville had fingernails left after a thrilling contest at Mosaic Stadium, decided in the final 11 seconds of play as the Riders emerged the victor with a stunning 24-21 final.

Saskatchewan will now advance to the 112th Grey Cup in Winnipeg Nov. 16, facing the best team in the East, the Montreal Alouettes.

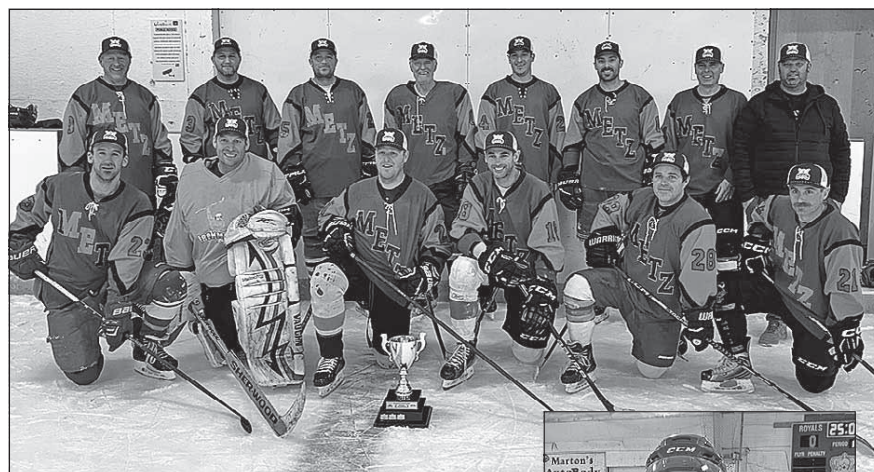

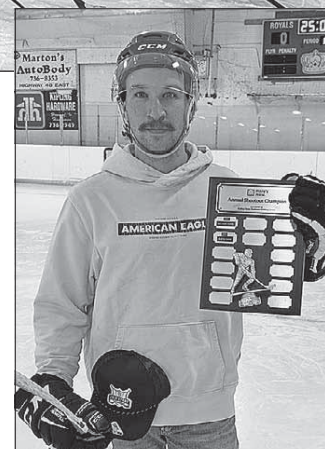

The Saskatchewan Roughriders are going to the big dance.

After not making it to a Grey Cup final since 2013, the Roughriders are headed to Winnipeg to face the Montreal Alouettes for the CFL championship game.

As the folks who watched this game will tell you, beating out the BC Lions was no easy feat.

Kudos to quarterback Trevor Harris for not allowing the moment to get too big for him and the rest of the team, as they had 1:03 left to get a major score, and drove it down the field like it was a walk in the park, culminating with a short pass into a tiny window, where Tommy Nield would score the eventual game winner.

A lot happened in the time between when the Riders got the ball back and the time that Nield's catch would send the Roughriders' faithful into a frenzy, but Harris was as calm, cool and collected as you'd expect a veteran pivot to be.

Harris said he looked at the time situation and thought he had plenty of time, and as it turned out, he was right.

It was never that last drive that surprised me the most about what will go down in the annals of CFL history as one of the greatest playoff contests ever, it was the play that lead up to it.

At a point when the Riders needed their defence to come up big, they did just that, holding the Lions to two two-and-outs and forcing punts.

A lot of teams would have tried to get the first downs, with time running out, but to the credit of Corey Mace, he held firm and let the defence do what they've done all season long.

Harris and the offence took care of the rest.

While the Roughies are on the way to the battle for the biggest prize in the sport, it was certainly a tale of two halves in this contest. Neither team was able to get a lot done offensively in the first half, but both seemed to find enough chinks in the armour of their opponents to move quite easily in the second half, with the Riders coming out of top because of the two huge defensive stands at the end.

At the end of the day, Harris out-dued BC's quarterback, Nathan Rourke, going 26 for 38 for 305 yards and two touchdowns while Rourke's 20 for 30 with a TD and a pick came in a distant second, despite having an extremely good performance of his own.

It was a big game for running back AJ Ouellette and wide receiver Sam Emilus, with the latter catching nine passes for an even 100 yards while Ouellette, a battering ram all season long, had 113 yards on 17 totes.

If the Riders are able to use Ouellette to keep the ball moving and Harris is able to find an open receiver to extend drives, they could make it a long, tough day for the Grey Cup's eastern representatives, the Montreal Alouettes.

The Riders' defence was solid, playing that bend-but-don't-break type of game, and they'll need to be on point against the Als and pivot Davis Alexander, who is unbeaten coming into the final game of 2025.

It's Montreal's second Grey Cup final in three years, and they can't be counted out, even though one might believe that the BC Lions were the biggest test the Green Riders will face in the playoffs.

If it lives up to the hype, it could be a terrific game.

Both teams have a dynamic offence and a stingy defence, so the difference could be execution.

Saskatchewan definitely has the more experienced quarterback, but Harris will have to guard against being too careful.

Against the Lions, there were times when I thought I was watching Cody Fajardo, with all the short passes Harris was attempting.

He'll have to trust his arm and his receivers if he expects to get a ring.

Alexander may be interested in opening things up a little more, but he'll have a short leash, especially if his hamstring begins to act up.

He'll have to complete passes, because it'll be difficult to run a lot versus the Riders.

Anyway, make a plan to get all your shopping done prior to Nov. 16, because if you're part of Rider Nation, you're not going to want to miss a second of it.

With 12 years between Grey Cup appearances, who knows when they'll be in this position again?

## Gambling advertising getting out of control

Data about cigarettes causing cancer eventually resulted in tobacco advertisements being banned from print and electronic media, but will the data about lives being ruined by gambling addiction eventually force governments to ban the media distribution of gambling ads?

Probably not, because the amount of money involved is enormous and some of the major media outlets in the United States are not only profiting from those advertisements, but they're involved with betting outlets as co-partners.

Ever tried to put the toothpaste back into the tube? That's where the world is at with sports gambling and it's probably going to get worse before it gets better.

(Full disclosure: Your correspondent gambles on sports, in nickel-and-dime fashion, and while a mini addiction has probably developed, my financial stability is not at stake.)

One can't turn on a televised sports event without seeing gambling firms urging fans to bet this, parlay that, take the under - will your favourite team cover a 7.5-point spread? Television networks reportedly collected \$434 million in sportsbook commercials

in 2024. So, as theorized by columnist Colby Hall of Mediate.com, networks aren't covering the rise in problem gambling, which statistically is growing more among young men, "because they're getting paid not to."

When there is huge money involved in anything — millions and billions — organized crime can't be far behind. The recent criminal charges filed against three National Basketball Association figures also involved four New York-based crime families.

If a point guard for a small college in Utah can be guaranteed a mob-related cash payment of a couple of thousand dollars for intentionally going "under" on his posted point total for a game in mid-January, what would stop a pro hoopster from agreeing to do the same for a couple of hundred thousand dollars?

Don't think it's not happening. Toronto Raptors Jontay Porter lost his NBA career after getting a lifetime ban for doing just that; gamblers were informed pre-game that he would bow out of a game, claiming injury, in the first quarter, guaranteeing that his point total would be under a certain number. Those in on the scam laid down big money on Porter's position and

cached in even bigger.

Recently, Portland Trail Blazers coach Chauncy Billups and Miami Heat guard Terry Rozier were implicated in gambling-related endeavours, adding to the ever-growing list of athletes caught up in the idea of making big money the easy, illegal way.

Betting on sports events has long been a common way of life in Europe, but it was generally illegal in North America until the U.S. Supreme Court said in 2018 it would allow states to regulate sports betting. In Canada, betting on sports events has been allowed even longer, as provincial lottery bodies have run Sport Select and other similar games.

Guaranteeing the elimination of criminal activity surrounding sports betting is folly. Bettors are more likely to ask themselves, however, 'am I playing a legitimate game or has the result been predetermined?'

# Discover the other Mary Simon live at the QVCA

With the chilly winds of November, something in the air sends us looking to discover the comfortable sounds of a music we haven't heard before, to warm us.

With her strong stage presence and rich whisky voice, pop country singer Mary Simon is certainly a talent that will make your heart sing when she performs at the Qu'Appelle Valley Centre for the Arts on Nov. 22.

Simon, (not to be confused with the Governor-General), is a songwriter and musician originally from Burlington, Ont. where she began singing in a church choir when she was still a teenager.

"I grew up doing a lot of music in the church. I even went to Briercrest in Saskatchewan one sum-

mer, but I left the church when I was 33 years old. I couldn't stand the judgment anymore," she told The Times in a telephone interview.

She started taking voice lessons when she was 17 and learned how to breathe. That she says "changed my life. It made a big difference."

The way she approaches song writing differs with each recording. She cites Neil Young, Tom Petty and Cheryl Crowe as her musician influences. "Sometimes I work with a co-writer, sometimes I write on my own."

During the Covid epidemic she and a friend moved into a trailer and wrote songs, including her signature tune, *Heart Sing*, with its provocative beat and lyrics.

"It'll make your heart sing, rolling with the ebb and flow we don't have to tippy toe anymore, I don't care what people say, we're going to do it anyway."

Simon has performed on Princess and Carnival Cruise ships and has just returned from playing a festival on an island near Cancun, Mexico.

When she isn't touring she gives voice, piano and guitar lessons in Hamilton and is currently working on a new album.

Mary Simon plays at the Qu'Appelle Valley Centre for the Arts in Fort Qu'Appelle on Sunday, Nov. 22. Admission is \$25. Doors open at 7 p.m., concert starts at 7:30.

# Local teachers secure innovation funding for new classroom projects

The provincial government has announced nearly \$1.4 million in new funding for 37 teacher-led projects through Saskatchewan's Teacher Innovation and Support Fund (TISF) — and several schools in the Melville, Whitewood, and Broadview area are among the recipients.

The Good Spirit School

Division's Melville Comprehensive School (MCS) will receive \$47,230 for its project titled "Crafting Connections: The MCS Reconciliation and Building Community Initiative."

The initiative focuses on blending technology and reconciliation education, helping students use digital tools and creative projects to explore relationships, history, and shared community learning.

In the Prairie Valley School Division, two schools in the region were also successful in their applications. Whitewood School will receive \$50,000 for "Supporting Student Well-Being Through a Dedicated Sensory Space," a project that aims to create a calm, inclusive environment where students can regulate emotions and focus on learning.

Similarly, Broadview School secured \$30,000 for "Our Sensory Room: Nurturing Minds & Emotions," which will provide resources and equipment designed to improve student mental health and engagement in the classroom.

Education Minister Everett Hindley said the fund continues to highlight the creativity and

leadership of Saskatchewan teachers.

"These approved projects represent the best kind of ideas our teachers bring to their classrooms to enhance learning," he said. "We're proud to support them and the students who benefit from these innovative approaches."

Established in 2024, the TISF allows teachers to apply for up to \$75,000 in funding for projects that promote innovation, well-being, reconciliation, or technology-based learning.

Since its launch, 136 projects province-wide have received funding totalling nearly \$2.5 million.

The three local projects — in Melville, Whitewood, and Broadview — are part of that growing network of teacher-driven initiatives helping Saskatchewan classrooms evolve through creativity, culture, and student-focused support.

# Canada Post outlines transformation plan

## Commits to protecting rural and small-town service

Canada Post has submitted a major transformation plan to the federal government outlining how it intends to modernize operations, cut costs, and ensure long-term financial sustainability — while pledging to maintain vital postal services in rural and small-town communities like those across southeast Saskatchewan.

The plan was delivered Friday to Joël Lightbound, Canada's Minister of Government Transformation, Public Works and Procurement. It follows new federal direction issued in late September that lifted long-standing barriers to reform and ordered the Crown corporation to find solutions to meet modern demands and avoid becoming a financial burden on taxpayers.

Among the proposed measures are the contin-

ued conversion of remaining door-to-door delivery to community mailboxes, modernization of post office networks, adjustments to delivery standards for letter mail, and reductions in administrative overhead.

Canada Post President and CEO Doug Ettinger said the plan is designed to help the postal service adapt to a rapidly changing economy driven by digital communication and e-commerce.

"The comprehensive plan we have submitted responds to our challenges and modernizes the postal service to support today's economy while serving all Canadians," Ettinger said. "Canadians deserve a postal service that is strong, stable and focused on meeting their changing needs."

The company emphasized that the plan includes safeguards to maintain accessibility for rural, remote, and Indig-

enous communities — a key concern for towns and villages where the local post office remains a central hub.

Once the federal government reviews and endorses the proposal, Canada Post says it will share details publicly with customers, employees, and communities.

The corporation's renewal strategy is guided by five principles: maintaining reliable and affordable service, proceeding thoughtfully, treating employees with respect, keeping Canadians informed, and remaining flexible to evolving needs.

For smaller communities, the coming months may determine how these commitments translate into practical changes — particularly for rural mail delivery and the future of local post offices that continue to anchor many main streets across Saskatchewan.

## Bail hearing adjourned in shooting death

Chris Fahlman will be spending a little more time behind bars as his bail hearing has been adjourned. Appearing via video in Regina Provincial Court on Nov. 6, the 42-year-old learned that his

matter would be set over to Nov. 14, allowing his defence lawyer more time to prepare. While Fahlman's lawyer Sharon Fox did receive a brief disclosure on Nov. 6, she noted it "created more questions than answers," and that the defence was not ready to proceed at the time.

Fahlman is facing charges of manslaughter with a firearm, careless use of a firearm, carrying a weapon for the purpose of committing an offence, and occupying a motor vehicle knowing there is a firearm inside.

Those charges stem from the Sept. 12 shooting death of Tanya Myers, 44, of Weyburn while she was the passenger of a vehicle driven by her friend, Andrea Morrice.

The 46-year-old said she and Myers were on their way home to Weyburn after spending the day at

a psychic fair in Regina. With only a few miles left in their journey along Highway 39 around 8 p.m., the black SUV Morrice was driving was fired upon.

First responders tried to revive Myers, but she was pronounced deceased moments after their arrival, despite lifesaving efforts.

After seven weeks of investigation, Fahlman was arrested Nov. 1 in Regina, appearing in Provincial Court a few times over the following week.

Fahlman is known to many throughout southern Saskatchewan as a home inspector with a business based out of Qu'Appelle. After news of his arrest broke on Nov. 2, the Saskatchewan REALTORS® Association was quick to confirm they had severed ties with Fahlman.
