

Standing Buffalo First Nation

Residential subdivision planned

Standing Buffalo Dakota First Nation intends to take advantage of the federal government’s Build Canada Homes Initiative program to develop a \$24 million 50-unit subdivision at the top of the valley above Buffalo Crossing.

The federal initiative announced by Prime Minister Mark Carney is designed to increase affordable housing by using modern modular and prefabricated construction methods.

If the project is approved, the integrated residential subdivision will provide affordable housing for 36 families and five elders. Five units have been reserved for police and other essential workers such as law enforcement officers and teachers. Four have been set aside for short term transitional housing for those who need it.

“We hope this will solve a long-standing housing shortage and overcrowding,” Chief Rodger Redman told Grasslands News. “The proposed subdivision planned just across the road from the new water treatment plant is expected to generate positive economic and service-related growth within the broader Qu’Appelle Valley region. Stable housing also

will relax the pressure on shared regional systems.”

Modular construction he points out is not only cheaper, but because the houses are built off site, it also reduces weather related delays and labour shortages.

The energy efficient units will be built by Best Buy Housing Corporation, western Canada’s largest supplier of modular homes. The co-ordinated site plan which has houses on both sides of crescent shaped streets allows for improved emergency access and support services.

A letter from the chief to the Calling Lakes Planning Commission has asked member municipalities to support the application “as an expression of regional goodwill.” Chief Redman says Standing Buffalo is not looking for any financial support from commission members, doesn’t need the commission to be involved in the administration of the subdivision nor does such an endorsement create any obligation the part of any member municipalities.

In addition to the subdivision Standing Buffalo Dakota First Nation also has plans for a \$15 million youth centre on the drawing board.

If the subdivision is approved, a sod turning ceremony is planned for June and the houses will be ready for occupancy in October.

About 500 people of the reserves 1,400 people live on the First Nation west of Fort Qu’Appelle.

Fort town councilors acclaimed

Kathy Dally and Lyle Lutz fill vacant seats

Kathy Dally, a registered nurse who came to Fort Qu’Appelle to work at Echo Lodge 15 years ago and Lyle Lutz, the Chair of the Prairie Co-op’s board of directors have been acclaimed to fill the two vacancies on Fort Qu’Appelle’s Town council.

Theirs were the only names filed for the election when nominations closed last Thursday.

“I’m at the time of my life where I have the time to serve the community. I think it is important,” Dally said when she was asked why she decided to stand for office. She’s been a registered nurse for 42

years and is the union lead for the southern half of the province. Born in Regina she attended High School in Yorkton and took her nurse training at the Wascana Institute of Applied Science and Technology in Regina.

Lutz farms near Lip-

ton but has lived in Fort Qu’Appelle with his family for the past five years. He is well known in the community not only as a Co-op executive but like the late councillor Ron Shordee shares a reputation as a familiar voice at the microphone during

the Fort Knox games at the Prairie Co-op Rexentre.

“Ron may have had a little influence on my decision to run for his seat on council but nothing serious,” Lutz said. “I’ve been weighing, wanting to do something different for a while now. I’ve been with the Co-op for 20 years I’ve a lot of board experience. We’ll see what that’s worth on council. We will see what it is like.”

Mayor Brian Strong welcomed the new additions as both being “a great asset to council.”

Half the council has changed since the last election 14 months ago. Two of the original council members resigned and one died in office.



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Hopkins Lake seen as outdoor swim option in Yorkton area

If all goes as well as hoped Yorkton and area residents may once again be swimming at Hopkins Lake.

A recently completed revitalization study of the lake was positive in terms of its potential to be restored, Connor Hunt, Director of Environmental Services, with the city told the regular meeting of Yorkton Council Monday.

The Hopkins Lake Revitalization Study was completed to answer the key questions that have delayed investment at this location.

"The completed study has confirmed that the lake's water quality is suitable for recreation, and it also concluded that the lake bottom does not

contain large volumes of sediment, which would require major remediation," he said.

Hunt said the current look at the lake is in response to local interest.

"Public interest in an outdoor swimming space has been clear, and Council has responded by directing administration to investigate whether Hopkins Lake can realistically support these activities as an existing community asset, what conditions protect or threaten water quality, and what practical improvements would be needed to support safe recreation," he explained.

The study was undertaken to answer such questions.

"The study documented existing lake conditions, including size

and depth, mapped the lake bottom, and measured sediment thickness," said Hunt.

"It also tested water quality over multiple sampling periods and reviewed water balance and watershed influences to better understand what supports long-term lake stability and what could change it over time."

The results were encouraging.

"Overall, the study concludes Hopkins Lake can be suitable for recreation and safe for swimming. Sampling showed low E. coli levels, good water clarity, and low nutrient levels during the monitoring completed," said Hunt. "... In short, the lake's best future role is public swimming and recreation, not a managed fishery."

The study also tested

a long-standing concern that the lake is full of sediment and would require large-scale dredging before it could be used again.

"The lake mapping and sediment measurements did not support that belief," said Hunt.

The lakebed is described as sand and gravel with soft sediment that varies but is generally thin.

"This supports Administration's view that the project can move forward without assuming costly major lake-wide dredging, and that any earthwork should be confirmed through design and focused only where needed," said Hunt.

Finally, the study notes that water quality does not appear to be degraded by runoff from nearby uses such as the ball diamonds or dog park, while recognizing that runoff pathways; particularly near the dog park.

"Based on the evidence gathered, the study concludes that restoring Jaycee Beach as a swimmable area and improving the surrounding park experience is feasible," said Hunt.

"... Based on these findings, Administration believes the project has merit to advance and is requesting Council approval of a design budget to progress through design in 2026 and produce a tender-ready package for early 2027."

The cost of the design study was pegged at \$250,000, with funding suggested to come from the City's Rainy Day Fund.

As part of advancing the project, Administration also intends to engage the Climate Ready

Infrastructure Service to strengthen climate resilience and improve funding readiness throughout design, said Hunt.

Ultimately, Hunt said the lake could fulfill an identified 'want' within the community.

"Put simply, Hopkins Lake has the potential to meet outdoor swimming demand at a similar order of magnitude to a new-build outdoor pool in a medium-sized city, but at a much lower capital cost," he said.

Councillor Quinn Haider said the prospect of returning Hopkins Lake to a swimmable water excites as it was a place he enjoyed as a youth.

"It ruled and it was awesome," he said. "I'm 100 per cent in support... to make this a reality."

"I like the idea a lot," echoed Councillor Darcy Zaharia, but then he added he had some concerns too.

Zaharia noted the lake would not likely generate revenues, but there would be annual costs – staff, insurance etc – that are an unknown.

He said he would like at some point an idea of annual operational costs "before I put a quarter million into pre-design."

Director of Finance Ashley Stradeski said

until it is determined what exactly they might build, estimating operating costs is impossible. He said they "might take a stab at it," but it probably wouldn't be right.

"It seems like a fairly large investment to get to that point," countered Zaharia.

Mayor Aaron Kienle said the scope of the project can be fairly flexible at this point.

"The project can grow... Be done in stages," he said, adding it all has to start with a plan.

"I'm in favour of moving forward to the next step," said Coun. Randy Goulden.

Councillor Greg Litvanyi was on side too, noting he sees the project as a cost-effective option for an outdoor pool.

"People are excited about it and want to see it happen," he said.

Council would approve the \$250,000 for the next step in the process, with Zaharia the lone vote against.

For context; Hopkins Lake was dredged and operated as Jaycee Beach from the 1960s through the early 1980s, and over time the site transitioned into its current use as a walkable park that includes trails, ball diamonds, a dog park, and a campground.

Fort Qu’Appelle is thrilled to welcome the Grey Cup Community Tour this Saturday!

Rider fans can take their photo with the 2025 Grey Cup Championship trophy from 3 to 5 p.m. on Saturday, Feb. 28 at the Fort Qu’Appelle Camp-ground.

The Grey Cup will be in Fort Qu’Appelle on Saturday as part of this year’s Winter Festival. Rider fans can see the trophy and take photographs right after the Polar Bear dip between 3 and 5 p.m. on Saturday.

At least 15 people have signed up for the annual Polar Bear jump which will go ahead as planned at 2 p.m. on nearby Echo Lake Saturday. The festival officially kicks off with cer-

emonies at the Prairie Co-op Rexentre at 6:30 p.m. on Friday just before the first game in the first semi-final game in the Saskatchewan Junior Hockey League Bill Johnson division between Fort Knox and the Richardson Pioneer Southern Rebels.

The pared down program continues through weekend with several activities including a pancake breakfast at the Legion, a turkey shoot at the curling club, a scavenger hunt, main-stage events at the Old Fort on Saturday including an illusionist and a fireworks display. At 1:30 p.m. Saturday Mayor Brian Strong will be at the Old Fort to announce the winner of the town’s official bird contest.

urday jump is more than a fundraiser for the Fort Qu’Appelle fire department. It is also a FUN raiser that has consistently attracted enthusiastic supporters eager to make the

plunge no matter the weather. The coldest day on record for the jump was seven years ago when temperatures plunged to -40°C, but even then, six people still took part. This year weather conditions are expected to be sunny but cold.

Most of those who have participated in previous years have told Grasslands News that they experience “a popside rush for a few seconds, then you melt away in a hot tub.” Alicia Fenske who jumped last year plans to jump again this year. “It was a new experience, a jolting experience, a teeth-chattering experience, but it is for a good cause, so I’m doing it again. Brett Boha who made the plunge three year ago said “It’s a healthy thing to do. I kind of

fell in love with the wellness of it. It helps with mental health and helps get rid of inflammation of the joints. It’s pretty cool.”

Those who strip to their undies and jump agree it is not something you can consciously prepare for. You just go for it, run and take the plunge and think of getting into the hot tub.

Each participant is rewarded with a swag bag of goodies. Since it began the Polar Bear Swim has raised almost \$50,000 to buy equipment for the fire department. A word of caution, anyone who wants to take part should be relatively physically fit. People with high blood pressure or heart disease should check with a doctor before making the jump.

Province assessing accessibility at more than 500 public buildings

Yorkton, Melville, Fort Qu’Appelle, Grenfell, Odessa part of assessments

The Saskatchewan government has begun in-person accessibility assessments on more than 500 provincially owned buildings - a multi-year effort officials say is aimed at identifying barriers and planning upgrades to make public spaces more inclusive.

The assessments are being led by the Ministry of SaskBuilds and Procurement and cover buildings owned by the province across urban, rural and Indigenous communities. Each facility will receive a detailed audit report examining both interior and exterior features, including entrances, hallways and public-facing areas.

“It’s something we’re really proud of,” Sean Wilson, Saskatchewan’s minister of SaskBuilds and Procurement, said of the gargantuan task. “We care about everybody in this province, and this is just one more way of showing it; making sure that it’s accessible for people.”

Wilson said the scope includes about 500 buildings provinciewide, including a number of assessments already scheduled or underway in the Grasslands News reader-ship area.

“There’s 17 assessments in Yorkton, 14 in Fort Qu’Appelle, and five in Melville and Moosomin,” Wilson said.

Additional communities with single-digit assessments include Churchbridge, Grenfell, Langenburg, Milestone, Odessa, Kamsack and Weyburn, with some communities having more than one provincially owned facility reviewed.

“So, basically, we’re conducting in-person assessments to identify the opportunities to improve the accessibility across

these 500 provincially owned buildings,” Wilson said. “And it comes down to creating more inclusive - and more importantly - accessible public spaces for everybody.”

Assessments go well beyond basic features such as wheelchair ramps and wider doors. Each building is evaluated individually, reflecting differences in age, design and condition.

“The assessments — we examine interior, exterior, and then every building gets an audit report,” Wilson said. “It outlines the barriers and accessibility, the improvement opportunities that we have for those specific facilities.”

Many of the buildings vary widely in age, with some constructed decades ago and others more than a century old.

“That’s the whole purpose for that audit plan,” Wilson said. “To figure out which ones are going to take a little more work, which ones are going to take a little less work.”

While the assessments themselves do not involve construction work, the audit reports will help inform future decisions on upgrades, investments and potential tenders once priorities are identified.

The work aligns with the Government of Saskatchewan Accessibility Plan 2024–2027, which is required under The Accessible Saskatchewan Act.

“These assessments are an important step in ensuring that our government facilities support and accommodate all residents,” Wilson said in a statement. “The results will support planning to enhance accessibility across Saskatchewan.”

Project planning began in spring 2025, with pilot assessments launched in November to test and refine procedures. To date,

18 buildings have been assessed.

Wilson said the government expects to complete all assessments by the end of 2027.

“The pilot assessment started November of ’25, so we’re trying to get our procedures and get everything refined before we fully implement it,” he said.

Background on the plan

The Accessibility Plan began with The Accessible Saskatchewan Act, which came into force on Dec. 3, 2023, and mandates that the provincial government publicly post an accessibility strategy. Officials say the plan was developed following extensive consultation with people with disabilities, guided by the principle “Nothing about us, without us.”

More than 1,000 people participated in a public survey conducted between April and May 2024, sharing experiences with physical, communication and attitudinal barriers when interacting with government. Respondents identified challenges such as inaccessible building entrances and parking, confusing websites, lack of captioning or screen-reader compatibility, and being treated differently because of disability.

The plan defines bar-

riers as anything that hinders full and equal participation in society and categorizes them as physical, information and communication, or attitudinal. Examples include buildings accessible only by stairs, small or unreadable print, inaccessible digital documents, and assumptions about a person’s abilities.

Seven goals guide the 2024–27 accessibility plan. One priority is improving employee knowledge and awareness. More than 5,000 government workers have already completed disability awareness training since 2018, and the province plans to expand accessibility-focused training across ministries.

Another major focus is making government buildings more accessible. Additional buildings are under review, and future construction and renovations will include accessibility requirements. The plan also calls for more braille signage, improved washrooms and reception areas, better accessible parking, and completing upgrades at the Royal Saskatchewan Museum.

Accessibility improvements are also planned for provincial parks. The province has added accessible campsites, pools, playgrounds, docks and

beach wheelchairs at multiple locations. Over the next three years, two parks per year will undergo formal accessibility reviews, and new online tools will highlight accessible park features.

The plan includes steps to improve access to government programs and services. Initiatives already underway include height-adjustable medical exam tables, mobile outreach services, expanded online self-service for income support and disability programs, free Wi-Fi in client service centres, and the introduction of dyslexia-friendly library materials and sign language curricula.

Digital accessibility is another priority. Saskatchewan.ca and other online services are being reviewed using accessibility testing tools, and future digital contracts must meet recognized web accessibility standards. Planned projects

include a redesigned student aid system, accessible transcript downloads, and an accessibility review of the Highway Hotline app.

The plan also commits to supporting a more inclusive provincial workforce through improved accommodation policies, mental health initiatives and better data on employee disabilities.

Finally, the government says it will provide leadership by supporting public-sector organizations in meeting accessibility requirements, embedding accessibility into procurement, and establishing a senior executive committee to oversee implementation.

The accessibility plan will be reviewed and updated every three years, with the government encouraging ongoing public feedback to identify barriers and track progress.

Town adopts new insurance requirements policy for facility users

Groups and organizations using Town-owned facilities and land in Whitewood were reminded they will now be required to carry their own insurance coverage under a new policy adopted by council at its Feb. 24 meeting.

Council approved Policy No. 29, the Insurance Requirements Policy, which sets out mandatory insurance standards for individuals, clubs, committees and organizations operating on Town prop-

erty.

According to the policy, the purpose is to ensure all user groups carry appropriate insurance “to protect both the Town and the user group from liability arising from their activities.” The Town’s own insurance covers municipal assets such as land, buildings and equipment, but does not extend to the operations or liabilities of independent groups.

Under the new rules, all groups renting Town facilities or land, organizations operating under lease or long-term agreements, and independent clubs or associa-

tions must provide proof of Commercial General Liability insurance. The minimum required coverage is \$2 million per occurrence, with the Town of Whitewood named as an additional insured. Proof of insurance must be submitted annually or prior to each rental or event.

Groups with a board or executive that make governance or financial decisions must also carry Directors and Officers insurance, with proof provided annually. The policy further states that any group storing equipment or supplies in Town buildings is responsible for insuring their own contents.

Additional insurance requirements may apply for large public gatherings, alcohol-related events, high-risk activities, tournaments or competitions, with the Town reserving the right to request higher coverage limits where necessary.

Mayor Chris Ashfield said the policy is about ensuring the municipality is not exposed to unnecessary financial risk.

“It’s important that we protect the Town and, ultimately, our taxpayers,” Ashfield said. “We’re proud to see our facilities used by community groups and organizations, but it’s essential that everyone understands the Town’s insurance only covers Town assets. This policy makes expectations clear and en-

tures both the user groups and the municipality are properly protected.”

The policy includes exemptions for Town-established committees operating under council authority and covered by the municipality’s governance structure, at the discretion of the chief administrative officer.

Failure to provide proof of insurance could result in denial of access to facilities or land, suspension or termination of leases or rental agreements, and the Town declining liability for uninsured activities.

The policy will be reviewed every three years, or as required.

Whitewood lists \$118,000 in unpaid property taxes

Almost \$116,000 in outstanding property taxes are currently listed on the Town of Whitewood’s annual tax enforcement roll.

According to the municipality’s 2026 Tax Enforcement List, a total of \$115,799.88 in arrears is owing across 26 properties. The list was prepared under Saskatchewan’s Tax Enforcement Act, which allows municipalities to begin formal recovery proceedings when taxes remain unpaid.

Under the legislation, if arrears and associated costs are not paid in full, the town may register a tax lien against the affected properties. The amounts published include additional costs required under subsection 4(3) of the Act.

The largest single arrear listed totals \$23,923.39, while another property shows \$21,687.76 owing. Several other properties exceed \$5,000 in unpaid taxes, including amounts of \$10,200, \$8,648.62, \$7,199.80 and \$5,653.79.

Most remaining arrears fall between \$1,400 and \$2,800.

Municipal officials note that tax enforcement is a legislated process and does not necessarily mean

properties will proceed to sale. Registration of a tax lien is often used as a mechanism to encourage payment and protect the municipality’s financial interests.

Property taxes are a primary source of revenue for communities the size of Whitewood, supporting services such as road maintenance, water and sewer infrastructure, fire protection, recreation facilities and general municipal operations. When taxes go unpaid, the burden can shift to other ratepayers or delay planned projects.

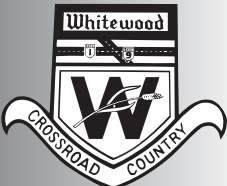
Under provincial legislation, once a tax lien is registered it remains against the title until the arrears are paid. If taxes remain unpaid for an extended period, the municipality may proceed toward tax sale proceedings in accordance with provincial timelines.

Municipal administrators typically work with property owners before matters reach that stage, offering payment arrangements where possible.

The tax enforcement list is a routine annual requirement for Saskatchewan municipalities and is publicly advertised to provide notice to affected landowners.

Town officials encourage residents with

outstanding balances to contact the municipal office to discuss payment options and avoid additional penalties or legal action.

Sask NDP look to fill STC void

It's been nearly nine years since the Saskatchewan Transportation Company ceased operations after more than seven decades of bussing residents around the province. Reasons for shutting down the Crown service and selling the associated assets were mainly blamed on declining ridership numbers, which had dropped some 77 per cent since the peak in 1980. Financially, only two of the 27 routes were turning a profit, and the province came ahead by selling the assets for \$29 million – a bit more than the appraised \$25.7 million.

The opposition NDP were critical of the action, saying rural residents would feel the brunt of the decision, pointing to missed parcel delivery and medical appointments in the big cities. Back in 2020 when Ryan Meili was trying to retain his place as leader for the provincial NDP, his main campaign was around reviving the STC.

Recently, current opposition leader Carla Beck has made public the renewed intention to possibly bring back some sort of system.

"I have tasked one of our shadow ministers, Darcy Warrington, with coming back to me with some options for provin-

cial transportation strategy," Beck told Grasslands News. "I haven't put a lot of hard parameters on it other than looking at what the possibilities are out there."

While transportation has adjusted over the course of the past decade with private bus lines, couriers, and ride share apps meeting the transportation shortfall, Beck maintains the same concerns as before still dominate rural Saskatchewan.

"We're around the province a lot," she said of her team. "We spend a lot of time on the road, and it's surprising to me the amount of times that it still comes up. I've been in Prince Albert and heard from people who have missed pacemaker appointments because they couldn't get transportation to Saskatoon. People who have missed funerals of loved ones, seniors who've had to move in from rural Saskatchewan to the city, leaving communities where they grew up because they just didn't have reliable transportation into services that they needed. That, coupled with the amount of rural health-care closures that we've seen, it's just the decision that they've had to make."

Hence the assignment for the Highways, Infrastructure, and SGI critic to take the pulse of transportation in Saskatchewan to develop a strategy moving

forward.

"We do have a unique ability in Saskatchewan to look at what we've got and find a way to make it work," Beck said. "That's really what I've tasked MLA Warrington with here - let's look at what we've got, where there are gaps, where there's funding available."

Part of that solution could be simply funding not-for-profit community shuttles reliant on volunteers and fundraisers to keep afloat.

"There are huge gaps that still exist in this province that are impacting people's quality of life, their businesses, their ability to live in their home communities," Beck said. "This really is about looking at what possibilities exist out there; how can we build a system that ensures at its heart that we have a provincial transportation strategy that is affordable and meets the needs of Saskatchewan people."

Affordability, safety, and reliability are factors in finding out the best way to move rural and northern people from Point A to Point B.

When asked about a deadline for the transportation strategy, Beck joked, "before the next election!"

"Often, one of the things I find when we're doing these consultations is how quickly the patterns

emerge," she said. "The people in this province certainly know and are willing to talk about where the problems are, but what I love the very most about this province is that people don't stop there. They want to talk about where the solutions are and how quickly those themes

form."

Back in 2017, the province noted the STC's per-passenger subsidy grew from \$25 per passenger 10 years prior to \$94. Forecasts predicted the Crown would need over \$85 million in subsidies just to continue operations. Main terminals

were in Prince Albert, Regina, and Saskatoon with the latter two cities also housing maintenance facilities for the fleet. The STC originated in 1946 by an Order in Council, mandated to provide services between major centres and rural populations as much as possible.

The events set off a wave of violence in at least 20 states in Mexico, with lockdowns in place to protect civilians. With this being the peak season for Canadian snowbirds to spread their wing in a southerly direction, concerns for safety of family and friends are paramount and a great way to update a lot of people quickly is obviously through social media.

But how truthful is the message?

Since the violence erupted in Jalisco, many false accounts, images, and videos have flooded social media channels, making it difficult to decipher what exactly is occurring. The best bet is to seek out what media outlets are saying, but it seems a tough stretch to get a nose out of Facebook and onto a news website. So, we joined the ranks of the Totally Blocked - along with China, Iran, Russia, Myanmar, North Korea, Turkmenistan, and Uganda.

A referendum built on contradiction and fear

It is hard to understand and even harder to stomach Alberta Premier Danielle Smith’s attack on immigrants. Especially given the Brooks-Medicine Hat riding she represents as the City of Brooks fashions itself “The City of 100 Hellos” as tribute to their multiculturalism. Nearly 50 per cent of Brooks’ population arrived in the southern Alberta city from somewhere outside Canada.

Smith has announced she will hold a provincial referendum in October on Canada’s “open border immigration policies” and their imagined impact on Alberta. Her hair-brained reasoning is little more than a pale carbon copy of U.S. President Trumps agenda and her own misguided MAGA, a “Make Alberta Great Again” campaign which would create a two-tier system of Canadian citizenship, seize control of the courts, abolish the senate and challenge the rule of law in this country.

In doing so she is appealing to xenophobes to approve her plans to deny newcomers to that province of their social and employment benefits.

“Although sustainable, immigration has always been an important part of our provincial growth model,” she said, immigrants have “flooded our classrooms, emergency rooms, and social support systems with far too many people far too quickly. We can no longer be asked

to subsidize the entire country through equalization and federal transfers, permit the federal government to flood our borders with new arrivals, and then give free access to our most generous in the country social programs to anyone who moves here,” Smith argued.

Predictably, Smith blamed former Prime Minister Justin Trudeau for the problem and blithely ignored that was she herself who supported the “Alberta is Calling Campaign” which was created to attract immigrants to Alberta and begged Trudeau’s then immigration minister Mark Miller to “immediately increase” the number of immigrants each year in 2024, 25 and 26 by 20,000 each year.

“This would support our efforts

to address critical labour shortages and supports a collaborative federal-provincial relationship that respects Alberta’s regional immigration needs. This increase will support the transition of this group to permanent residency,” she wrote at the time. She also conveniently failed to mention that the rate of Alberta’s population growth actually declined during the Trudeau years than when Stephen Harper was Prime Minister.

Alberta has legitimate grievances that must be addressed but Smith’s Trumpian solution and her nine referendum questions not only border on fascism but invite constitutional turmoil and threatens Canadian unity from within.

Survivor speaks on loss, reconnection and identity

February is Indigenous Storytelling Month in Saskatchewan, which highlights and celebrates First Nations and Métis oral traditions. Libraries and schools across the province welcome storytellers, elders, and knowledge keepers to learn the culture, history, and traditions of First Nations people as a tool for reconciliation and to promote understanding of indigenous culture, beliefs, values, and ways of life.

Tracey George Heese was one such storyteller to travel around the province this month, sharing her knowledge and history. Stops along her tour included a visit to the Vibank Public Library, Montmartre School, and Emerald Ridge Elementary School in White City.

A member of Ochapowace First Nation, George Heese began her tour at the Weyburn Public Library, where she presented her story to a group of women from the area. This visit sparked a conversation on her background and culture. From there, she was invited to participate in this year’s Indigenous Storytelling Month.

George Heese was adopted at the age of 12 by a German-Mennonite

family during the Sixties Scoop—an infamous time in Canadian history when First Nations children were taken from their homes and adopted into predominantly white, middle-class families across Canada and the United States. During this process, many adoptees were left lost between cultures, disconnected from their ancestral lands, families, and communities, while unable to fully integrate into their adoptive societies.

It is this disconnect that forms the basis for one of George Heese’s stories, “Baby Bird,” which she shares with younger students as an age-appropriate way of shedding light on the tumultuous time in Canadian history.

“It’s an actual event that happened to me when I was little, with my grandmother,” George Heese says. “It talks about touching a baby bird, and maybe the mama bird won’t take the baby back. That’s something that happens for us Sixties Scoop survivors. We didn’t fit into the adopted family and didn’t fit back into our biological families.”

According to the now defunct Department of Indigenous Affairs, around 11,132 children were taken from their homes and adopted out between 1960 and 1990, while some research indicates that number is much higher at closer to 20,000 children displaced. In 1981, 45 to 55 per cent of First Nations children were believed to be adopted by American families, removing them not only from their culture, but the country as well.

“I didn’t learn much about the Sixties Scoop until the 90s, I would say,” George Heese says. “I lived life not knowing. There were things I

remembered when I did get to see my grandma again. She couldn’t even speak. She only cried and was so grateful we were alive. I was at least 18 or 19, learning from my biological family that the fear was kids were being adopted to be slaves, or to be exploited and misused. There is a long list of different abuses that happened to children in care and who were adopted. That was the biggest fear for my biological family.”

While some adoptees, like George Heese, were placed in supportive and loving homes, they could not be provided culturally specific education. Some adoptees reported abuse at the hands of their adopted families, causing trauma that would persist through the generations that came after. This trauma on both adoptees and their biological families was immense and long-lasting, but hidden for years, only to surface for many much later in life.

“It wasn’t until I was much older when I learned from my grandfather, the day we went missing, what that did to him,” George Heese says. “He went looking in the bush. He thought maybe an animal had taken us. He tried to get help.”

Like many families who lost children during the Scoop, George Heese’s grandparents and mother were not informed before she and her sisters were taken by the government and transported to Saskatoon to be entered into care and then adopted.

“The story I’ve told as well, my grandmother had gotten ill and she had gone into the hospital,” George Heese says. “This blue Ford came out into our yard and this really nice lady with blue eyes and blonde hair came and



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Storytelling brings bridges gaps

Indigenous Storytelling Month has come to an end, and for Tracey George Heese, it was a way to share her knowledge and experiences with the next generation. asked me if we wanted a ride. I didn’t know what that meant when I was a little kid. So she put the three of us girls in her car and we ended up in Saskatoon. My sisters and I were separated.”

George Heese was around seven or eight at the time of her abduction. She says no one helped her grandfather in his search, and he was not informed until later where his grandchildren had gone. While her adopted mother was able to reach out and find George Heese’s biological family, George Heese says her situation was rare, and other Scoop survivors were usually not so lucky.

“Families didn’t do that,” George Heese says. “The ministry didn’t help families that wanted to help their kids be reconnected. My parents were warned they didn’t want to connect to my biological family. There has definitely been racism within all levels of government and systems.”

George Heese’s adopted mother was not given any information on her background, besides a last name: George. She gathered Regina and Saskatoon phone books and called every George listed, searching. She managed to reconnect George Heese to her biological family and give both sides a chance to reconnect and heal some of the trauma they had endured.

“It’s a government kidnapping and we were displaced,” George Heese says. “When you think of that, you need to think of your own children being taken at seven or eight and having no knowledge or contact.”

George Heese counts herself one of the fortunate ones who were able to reconnect to her roots. She says the community took her under their wing and taught her the levels of her culture that

she previously had been unaware of.

“The interesting thing is, not long ago, my girlfriend who is also a Sixties Scoop survivor asked me if I wanted to go to Brandon, Manitoba, for a blanket ceremony,” George Heese says. “There I went, not knowing exactly what that was. It was a ceremony with prayers and songs. They wrapped me in a blanket and it was so emotional. Even though I got some of my family back in different stages, it was almost like an awakening. A birth. Being welcomed back into the community.”

Through Indigenous Storytelling Month, George Heese says she is able to open a dialogue when it comes to topics of identity, family, and the generational trauma associated with events like the Sixties Scoop and residential schools.

“That’s the thing that has happened to our communities,” George Heese says. “It’s big stuff, but people need to learn about this history. I feel like the more people are aware and the more I help educate, the more people are able to act and become allies. It’s to protect my grandchildren and protect the next generation coming. When you look at the statistics in child welfare today, it’s alarming for Indigenous kids. It’s so high. Some have said the number of kids in care today is more than were taken in residential schools. The Sixties Scoop is apparently all done, but I feel with birth alerts and such, it’s still so common as well.”

While George Heese says this month has been about passing on her knowledge and stories, it has also been a time for her to grow and converse with the participants as well.

“Me living the life I lived, I didn’t know,”

George Heese says. “I didn’t know what to call it, and I didn’t know what was happening to me had happened to lots of others as well. If you see a First Nations person, they are likely affected by residential schools or the Sixties Scoop. My grandparents were all in residential schools. My biological mother was in a residential school. I am almost 60 now and I look at my aunt, and she’s 75, and she went to residential school. That generation is still alive. Their lived experience wasn’t that long ago.

“I feel it’s improved,” she continues. “With the Indigenous Storytelling Month, National Aboriginal Day, and National Ribbon Skirt Day, these different events help bring awareness. I feel like it’s way better than what I had, and what my children had. It all helps.”

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Father and son forced to stay in Mexico as violence breaks out

Violence between the Mexican military and a major drug cartel broke out in Puerto Vallarta Feb. 22, leaving numerous holiday travellers in limbo in terms of getting home - including Yorkton’s Scott McLaughlin and his son.

McLaughlin told Grasslands News in a telephone interview Sunday evening that when they woke up that day, they were unaware anything was going on.

“We went downstairs for breakfast, and it looked like black clouds were rolling in,” said, adding he told his son it looked like rain was coming.

But then someone else at the resort they are staying at said “those are fires.”

At that point McLaughlin said they went to find out more.

“Staff were kind of hesitant to talk,” he said, adding he could understand they did not want to cause a panic.

In time though the situation became clearer. McLaughlin said the Mexican military apparently killed a cartel leader and that cartel retaliated “by trying to take over the city.”

As the day progressed the situation solidified. While McLaughlin noted the resort they are at is some distance from downtown Puerto Vallarta, they were occasionally hearing the fighting.

“You can hear gunshots now and then,” he said.

And people were finding out they were essentially stuck where they were as taxis and buses were not running.

One person McLaughlin knew was to fly out, but the airport was closed. He would learn from WestJet their flight Monday was also cancelled.

“There’s no transportation,” he said. Another person renting a condo in the

city went out for groceries and the military told them to go back and not be on the street.

McLaughlin said as of Sunday evening they had not heard directly from either Canadian or Mexican officials, although people are obviously wishing for greater clarity on the situation.

“Everybody’s carrying their phones close to their hearts,” he said.

In that regard, cellphones are a connection to the outside world.

“My phone has been exploding today,” said McLaughlin, adding the contact with family and friends are reassuring. “Everybody has been wonderful.”

So, for now it’s wait and see.

McLaughlin said the resort they are at “has been really good. . . I feel safe here,” adding other resorts “are very close to it (the fighting). I’m keeping it together - I’ve got no choice.”

As it is, “it feels like COVID all over again – you’re restrained for reasons you can’t control. . . You feel like a hostage,” offered McLaughlin. “. . . We’ll wait it out and see what happens.”

In a release Monday, Cathay Wagantall, Member of Parliament for Yorkton-Melville, issued a statement concerning the developing security situation in Mexico:

“The Government of Canada is closely monitoring the rapidly evolving security situation, including in and around Guadalajara and Puerto Vallarta,” she stated in the release.

“Local authorities have issued shelter-in-place orders in some locations. Canadians in Mexico are encouraged to follow this local advice.

“Consular officials are in close contact with local authorities and stand ready to assist Canadians in the affected areas.”

City turns down funding for Lutheran Church shingles

A request for some city dollars to help St. Paul Lutheran Church in Yorkton replace aging shingles has been turned down by Yorkton Council, but the city is fine with the work being done.

It was at the Jan. 5 meeting where Council Niall Sogbetun - vice chairperson for the church - presented to Council regarding a request for clarification of heritage rules and request for funding for restoration, identifying that the cedar shakes are in need of replacement, but replacing with the same style may be cost-prohibitive, explained Taylor Morrison, Director of Recreation & Community Services at this Monday’s Council meeting.

“The concern was what could be done under the municipal designation,” said Sogbetun in January. He noted that replacing the cedar shingles with new cedar shingles would almost be impossible, explaining a quote for cedar shingles if they can get cedar was just more than \$180,000.

By contrast a metal replacement would be \$130,000, and regular shingles about \$47,000.

At the time, Council referred the request to the Municipal Heritage Advisory Sub-Committee for review and recommendation on the proposed roof renovation, and for further information on funding and municipal/provincial heritage designations.

Through The Heritage Property Act, municipalities can designate properties as a tangible way to recognize people, places and events that are significant to the history of the community.

“Part of the process of designating

buildings includes identifying the character-defining elements that are significant to the community,” said Morrison.

St. Paul Lutheran Church was designated a Municipal Heritage Property in October 1998.

The Lutheran Church designation was made for several reasons including it being the oldest church building in Yorkton. Construction of the church began in 1896 with completion and opening in 1899.

The roof material was not a consideration in the designation, added Morrison.

“The cedar shakes are not recognized a defining feature for the heritage designation, and the Committee does not want to restrict this organization from moving forward with renovations,” he said.

That said Morrison added, “However, the committee encourages the church to consider maintaining the same look and feel with respect to colour and design, with whatever product they do decide to use.”

As for funds, the city has not done that sort of thing in the past.

“The City of Yorkton does not have grant funding available to municipally designated heritage buildings for their restoration or upkeep. The property owner remains responsible for these ongoing costs as may be required,” said Morrison.

There may be other options though.

“Further discussions between the Church and the Saskatchewan Heritage Foundation might prove helpful with respect to some financial support, in addition to possibly connecting with their national government body to explore infrastructure dollars, if they haven’t already,” offered Morrison.

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CTF urges province to tackle ‘massive debt’

The Canadian Taxpayers Federation is urging the Saskatchewan government to rein in spending, pay down debt and begin saving resource revenues as the province prepares its 2026 budget.

The CTF says Saskatchewan’s rising debt threatens recent tax relief and is costing taxpayers hundreds of millions of dollars a year in interest payments.

“We need to deal with our massive debt,” said Gage Haubrich, CTF Prairie director.

The group released its pre-budget submission this week, calling on the province to cut spending, eliminate the small business tax and establish a heritage fund similar to those in other jurisdictions.

Haubrich said Saskatchewan’s debt has more than doubled since Premier Scott Moe took office, rising from about \$10 billion to an estimated \$23.9 billion by the end of the current fiscal year.

“That’s something that the province has to deal with sooner rather than later, because all of that tax relief that the government’s brought in, it’s going to be at risk,” he said.

According to the CTF, Saskatchewan is projected to run a deficit of roughly \$2 billion this year alone. Haubrich said the government’s continued borrowing is driving up interest costs that taxpayers must eventually cover.

“The important thing for people to understand, for the province to understand, is that every single dollar that the government borrows has to be paid back plus interest,” he said. “Those interest payments are costing taxpayers hundreds of millions of dollars a year in the

province.”

The CTF estimates Saskatchewan will spend about \$878 million on debt interest this year — money Haubrich said could otherwise be used to fund services or reduce taxes.

“Something needs to be done to get that number going down,” he said. “And the only thing that can be done is that spending needs to be cut.”

The federation’s submission outlines a series of costed proposals it says could generate about \$2.045 billion in gross annual savings, resulting in a net budget improvement of roughly \$1.9 billion after accounting for a proposed tax cut.

Among the recommendations is eliminating Saskatchewan’s small business tax, which the group estimates would save businesses about \$56 million per year. The CTF also calls for bringing government compensation

in line with the private sector, ending corporate subsidies and conducting a broad spending review.

Haubrich said government salaries and benefits represent the single largest line item in the provincial budget.

“When we look at the government’s budget as a whole, the largest single line item every year is always paying government bureaucrats,” he said. “Any government that’s serious about actually cutting back and finding savings for taxpayers is going to have to tackle the cost of the bureaucracy.”

He said public-sector workers earn about five per cent more than their private-sector counterparts on average, despite doing similar work.

“It doesn’t seem fair to taxpayers that they should be getting extra money just because they work for the government,” he said.

Another key recommen-

dation is the creation of a Saskatchewan heritage fund to save non-renewable resource revenues for the future. Haubrich said relying on fluctuating resource income to fund ongoing spending leaves the province vulnerable when prices fall.

“The government should be under no illusion that the province’s resource revenues are going to last forever,” he said. “Eventually, those things are going to run out or something’s going to change.”

By saving and investing resource revenues during strong years, Haubrich said the province could stabilize spending, avoid sudden deficits and ensure future generations benefit from Saskatchewan’s natural wealth.

“When you’re saving that money, you’re investing it for the future,” he said. “It means that not

Chris Knight reports that a Canadian who built vehicle software at Tesla, constructed a NASA-funded 3D printer that was sent into space, and participated in the Royal Canadian Air Cadets glider program at the age of 16 now has his sights **set on building a hotel on the moon**. Skyler Chan, 22, is backed by the Y Combinator accelerator program and is also part of Nvidia’s Inception program. But there’s also the potential for money from would-be hotel guests. A hefty deposit of US\$1 million is required from those looking to book a spot. And the tentative opening date isn’t for another six years. Galactic Resource Utilization Space was founded by Chan who grew up in Vancouver and is a graduate of the department of Electrical Engineering and Computer Sciences at UC Berkeley. “Growing up, I always wanted to become an astronaut,” Chan told the National Post. “Chris Hadfield was my role model.” He said the space industry is “propped up by two pillars,” meaning government programs like NASA and billionaire-backed companies like SpaceX. “And we want to... extend the third pillar. Space tourism, which is already a proven market on Earth. We bring it to the moon, quite literally. We build the first hotel on the moon.” I don’t have much confidence and am pretty sure that if I have an extra million, I won’t be investing in GRU!

“RIP Catherine O’Hara, only 71, a great Canadian actress who was also outspoken about women’s rights,” noted Janice Hough, “and who said that the idea of Canada being the 51st state made her skin crawl.” Ouch!

Drivers on a central Florida highway got a disturbing show as they watched a **burning car rolling down US 192**. Patrick Rinaldi, 60, was arrested on suspicion of DUI after witnesses reported seeing him stop his smoking vehicle, then get back behind the wheel and drive off again, even as it caught fire. After driving a short distance, it stopped again, only now flames were taking over the vehicle, but once again Rinaldi drove away. More emergency crew time was consumed when firemen were needed to extinguish a roadside brush fire they believe was sparked by the burning car. Rinaldi’s wife was still inside the vehicle as it burned. Rinaldi managed to escape and was “barely able to help his wife” get out of the flames. He displayed all the classic signs of impairment. Rinaldi allegedly struggled with sobriety testing and refused a breath test, and was charged with driving under the influence and refusing to submit to DUI testing.

In the sprawling case over what authorities say is the **biggest jewelry heist the US** has ever seen, one key defendant just exited the country—and potentially the courtroom—for good. Court filings reveal that ICE deported Jerson Nelon Presilla Flores to Ecuador around Dec. 29, even as he faced federal charges tied to the 2022 Brink’s truck heist that stripped jewelers of an estimated \$100 million in gems and watches. Flores, one of seven men indicted, had pleaded not guilty and was staring at up to 15 years in prison on conspiracy and theft counts. His removal has effectively frozen the case against him and sparked questions about how two arms of the federal government appeared to work at cross-purposes. Flores opted against relief in immigration court, essentially choosing to functionally self-deport rather than remain in the US to fight the criminal charges and risk prison. I guess ICE is chasing some criminals!

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Yorkton adjusts its Residential Building Incentives

Yorkton Council tweaked the city's Residential Building Incentives at its regular meeting Monday.

Jennifer Brooker, Business Liaison with the city, said the city has had three residential incentives in place for some time – the Residential Lot Sales Rebate Program, Residential Construction Incentive Program, and Rental Housing Incentive Program.

As a successor to the

only the current generation benefits from those huge natural resources, but everyone in the future as well.”

While Finance Minister Jim Reiter was not available for an interview, the provincial government did address the idea of a heritage fund in a statement to Grasslands News.

“Before investing in a new heritage fund, the government will continue to prioritize funding that is needed for capital spending and sustaining necessary programs that people rely on, particularly in areas such as health-care, education, and community safety,” the note said.

“The Government of Saskatchewan also supports prudent management of its debt and maintains the second lowest net-debt-to-GDP ratio among provinces.”

The CTF has repeatedly used a travelling “debt clock” to highlight Saskatchewan’s rising debt, and Haubrich said the group will continue to do so if borrowing continues.

“As long as the debt keeps going up, we’ll keep bringing out the debt clock,” he said. “It’s one of the most important issues facing the government, facing taxpayers.”

Polling conducted by Insightrix shows 86 per cent of Saskatchewanians are concerned about how much money the provincial government is spending on debt interest.

Haubrich said that concern reflects household experience.

“Most people in this province have a mortgage, they have a car payment, they have a credit card, and they understand what happens when you get behind on those payments,” he said.

With the provincial budget expected within weeks, Haubrich said the federation hopes the government will act before debt pressures worsen.

“The government can’t keep kicking the debt can down the road,” he said. “There’s never a better time to start dealing with the debt than right now because it’s only going to get more difficult as time goes on.”

Show Home Rebate Program, Council adopted the Residential Lot Sales Rebate Program in 2024 and provides a 50 per cent rebate on the purchase price of city-owned residential lots, funded through the Land Fund.

Total funding was \$295,000.00, with \$15,204.62 remaining, explained Brooker, so remaining funding is insufficient to support another 50 per cent rebate and may deter additional lot sales.

Council would repeal

policy regarding the Residential Lot Sales Rebate Program. The RLSRP was adopted in 2024 and provides a 50 per cent rebate of the price off any city-owned residential lot. This policy also has a built-in expiry at the end of every year.

The Residential Construction Incentive program was adopted in 2022 in response to stagnant one- and two-unit home starts. Initially, this had limited impact. In 2023, the program was expanded to include three-

and four-unit dwellings, which led to construction of two four-unit rental dwellings.

Council approved reducing the term to a one-year tax abatement.

The Rental Housing Incentive Program was adopted in 2011 and provides a five year, 100 per cent tax abatement for anyone constructing five or more rental units. This policy has no expiry.

Since its inception in 2011, the Rental Housing Incentive Program has been issued on three oc-

casions, resulting in 40 new rental units, said Brooker.

The Sale of Residential Lot Policy, updated in 2022 to allow extended timelines (24 months) for a contractor to build on a city-owned residential lot prior to paying in full.

Council amended the Policy, being the Sale of Residential Lot Sales Policy, by adding allowances for progress-draw mortgages, with a term of one year and required building start within six months.

Whitewood Committees reshuffled following byelection

Mayor Chris Ashfield confirmed committee and deputy mayor appointments for 2026 during the Feb. 24 meeting of Whitewood town council.

The appointments follow the recent election of new councillor Jaimie Jordans, prompting adjustments to committee structures to ensure balanced representation and opportunities for all members of council.

Danielle Jones was appointed deputy mayor.

Committee assignments for 2026 include Shawna Stradeski to the Regional/Local Library board, Troy Brûlé to the Heritage Committee/Handi-Van, and Emerson Chug to Whitewood & District Health Care. Cole Jacobs was appointed to both Red Coat Waste and the Fire portfolio.

The Personnel committee will consist of Stradeski, Jones, Brûlé and Ashfield. Public Works will

include Jacobs, Jordans, Chug and Ashfield.

The Recreation/Golf Course committee will be made up of Chug, Jones, Stradeski and Ashfield, with only one committee member required to attend golf course meetings. Ashfield will serve on the Moosomin & District Healthcare Foundation, with Stradeski appointed as alternate.

Council as a whole will serve as the Budget and Economic Development committees. The Economic Development committee will meet twice annually at 6 p.m. during the second council meetings in April and November, and additionally as required prior to regular council meetings. Ashfield will sit on the Housing committee, while Jordans will sit on the Transportation Committee.

Ashfield said periodic changes to committee appointments are important to provide councillors with broader experience.

“It’s healthy for council to rotate committees from time to time,” he

said. “It gives councillors the opportunity to experience different areas of municipal governance and better understand how all parts of the community fit together.”

He added the recent changes were necessary following Jordans’ election to council.

“With a new councillor joining the table, it made sense to revisit committee assignments to ensure everyone has an opportunity to contribute in meaningful ways,” Ashfield said.

The appointments will remain in place as outlined, with a scheduled review in 2027.

LIBERALS LET CRIMINALS DODGE DEPORTATION

Imagine someone in your family is brutally assaulted. Imagine the police charge the criminal, and a jury delivers a guilty verdict. Now imagine a judge delivers a slap on the wrist. Why? Because the criminal is not a Canadian citizen, and a tough sentence would mean they would be deported.

Imagine the victim of that assault, living with the awful consequence of the assault. And the criminal? Not only is he allowed to stay in Canada, but he is out on the street early. All because his rights as an immigration applicant are prioritized over the rights of law-abiding citizens.

Is a victim less injured because the criminal is from another country? Of course not.

Yet this is the exact scenario that plays out too often in Canada. Thanks to the Liberal government, immigrants are given lighter sentences or completely avoid jail because a longer sentence would mean they would be deported! That means that if they were Canadian citizens they would get a tough sentence, but because they are here as immigrants, they get off easy.

This is the two-tiered justice system that the Liberals have created. Just take a look at some of these examples:

- An international student secretly filmed multiple female housemates through a bathroom peephole for months; the judge kept the sentence below six months to avoid triggering automatic deportation rules. (Winnipeg Sun – Oct 9, 2025)
- A foreign-born criminal in Brampton, already serving six years for fentanyl and gun crimes, had his cocaine-related sentence cut in half because the judge viewed likely deportation as a major added penalty. (National Post – Oct 14, 2025)

- A foreign-born criminal who twice groped a woman received a conditional discharge so no conviction would appear, preventing removal under federal immigration law. (Globe & Mail – Nov 25, 2025)
- A foreign-born criminal living in Kamloops on a work permit, who assaulted his girlfriend in multiple incidents, was given nine months' probation that would keep a conviction off his record if completed without issue. (Toronto Sun – Jan 29, 2026)

Conservatives have demanded that the Liberals put an end to this policy. We believe that justice should be blind, and that immigration status should not be a factor in sentencing. There is absolutely no public interest in letting dangerous and violent criminals stay in Canada.

Immigration to Canada is a privilege, not a right. It is the least we can do to expect people who immigrate here to follow the law.

In 2015, our system was well respected: fair to both newcomers looking for new opportunities and measured to meet the needs of our economy and social services. Conservatives will work to restore the Canadian consensus on immigration, from a time when our system was the envy of the world.

Conservatives will continue to demand changes that put the rights of honest Canadians first, deport dangerous offenders, and that treat everyone equally under the law. I know that people in Saskatchewan support this common sense approach. Unfortunately, the Liberals are so far refusing, and have indicated that they will keep this dangerous two-tiered sentencing system.

Area trio headed to 80+ Hockey Hall of Fame

Hockey, at least for some, is a lifelong pursuit.

For a few the long years of involvement might even garner them some national attention – at least within their own hockey fraternity.

Locally, the W.O. Grinders hockey team has kept many involved in the game for years beyond where most still lace up the skates.

“Our team is a 50-plus age group made up of players from Yorkton, Melville, Esterhazy, Bredenbury, Saltcoats, Spring-side, and Stockholm,” explained James Morton, a team spokesperson. “Our team plays twice a week at the Westland Arena, as well as in tournaments around our region.”

As with any team a few players have made some big contributions to the Grinders.

“Over the past few years, we have had three members of our team that have contributed to our team by playing or managing the team into their 80’s,” explained Morton.

The trio includes Wilmar Ostapowich, who is being inducted posthumously in the builder category for his developing and managing the Oldtime Grinders hockey team (later re-named W.O.Grinders after Wilmar in 1993 when he was 57) for years into his 80’s.

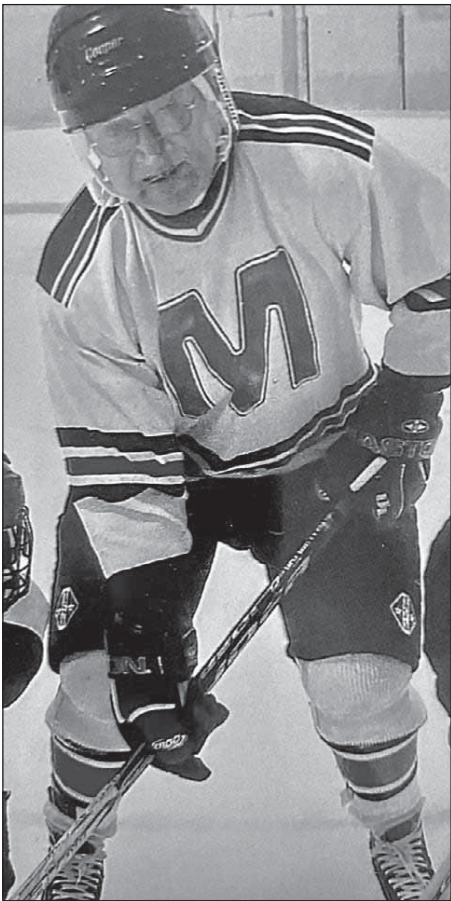
Ostapowich was a player back at the inception of the Grinders in 1993 when he was 57 and played into his 60’s until he felt the body could not keep up with the pace. He managed the team for years and looked after the refreshments and recruited players, said Morton.

“Wilmar used to go to the mall with Dorothy and sit out on the bench and watch men come into the mall and if they were over 50 years old he would talk to them to see if they played hockey and would try to recruit them to come and play with the Grinders.”

Ostapowich stayed on as the manager and as the refreshment fund until his passing in 2021.

John Garbutt was a goaltender who played with the Grinders until he was 83 years old until he moved to Weyburn to live with his son due to health reasons, continued Morton.

Nominated as a player/builder Garbutt played from 2005 until 2024 when unfortunately, at 83 years of age his health got the better of him and he had to retire from the game he loved, John was a true competitor and never missed a game. He played in several tournaments and exhibition games and was named the oldest

player in the Estevan Strippers Hockey tournament.

Richard Zurburg, 81, has been playing with the Grinders since 2011, and travels in faithfully from Esterhazy twice a week to participate.

The efforts of the trio were deemed worthy of added recognition by the Grinders.

“The Grinders team was looking to honour some of our players who dedicate their time and efforts to playing the game that we all love,” said Morton.

“We had renamed the team after Wilmar Ostapowich due to his efforts to manage the Grinders hockey team even after he was unable to continue playing.”

But they looked for other avenues of recognition.

“We had one of our players -- Glen Lapointe -- who found the information on the 80 plus Hall of Fame,” said Morton. “The team voted to induct all three members. . . due to their outstanding contributions to the W.O. Grinders.”

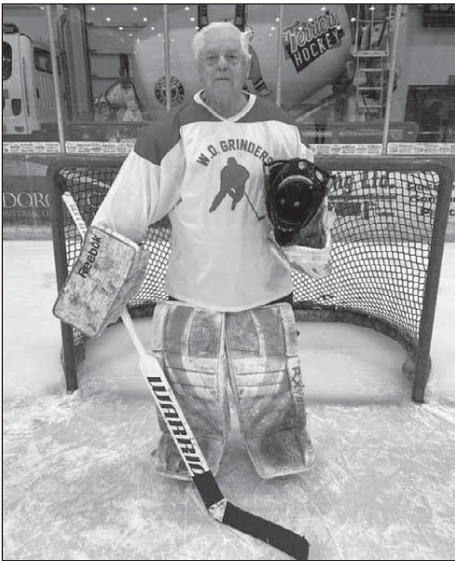
“We started the process a year ago and on April 18th we will share that moment with the inductees and their families.”

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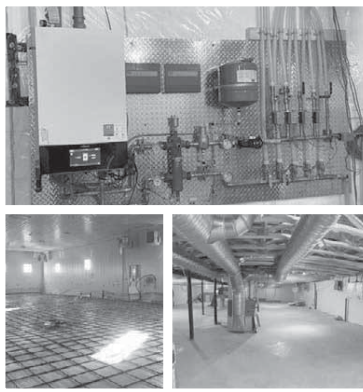

Charge laid in fatal collision; Fort RCMP handle 94 files

Fort Qu'Appelle detachment dealt with 94 occurrences over this past week. Some of the notable files are mentioned below.

Traffic
Traffic tickets and warnings issued for speeding, fail to yield right-of-way at uncontrolled intersection, exceed posted limit by 35 km/h, drive a vehicle with an obstructed plate, fail to produce license upon request, fail to produce registration upon request, drive while using an electronic device, drive while suspended, drive with unrestrained passenger under seven years of age, drive at a speed that impedes traffic, and drive

Mischief

Ten calls of mischief were received. All revolved around unwanted or intoxicated people inside a residence. No charges were laid, but some people were removed and/or relocated to prevent further problems.

A harassing communications investigation is ongoing. The 18-year-old complainant is being

contacted through social media by a 42-year-old male. The suspect is using multiple fake accounts to make contact.

Crimes Against the Person/Property

An assault complaint involving two elderly persons. No charge was considered and family and home care support in place.

A 24-year-old male was arrested for domestic assault, causing mischief and failing to abide by court conditions. Two victims were involved with minor injuries reported.

A 57-year-old male who was wanted for failing to appear in court was apprehended after a Crimestoppers Tip. The male had twice failed to show up for trial.

A 27-year-old male

was charged for breaking and entering a residence and committing mischief (property damage). The victim and the suspect are known to each other.

A fraud investigation is ongoing where the complainant found someone had deposited a cheque twice.

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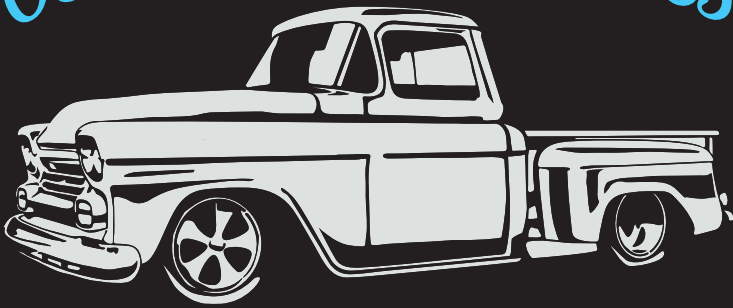

lively atmosphere.

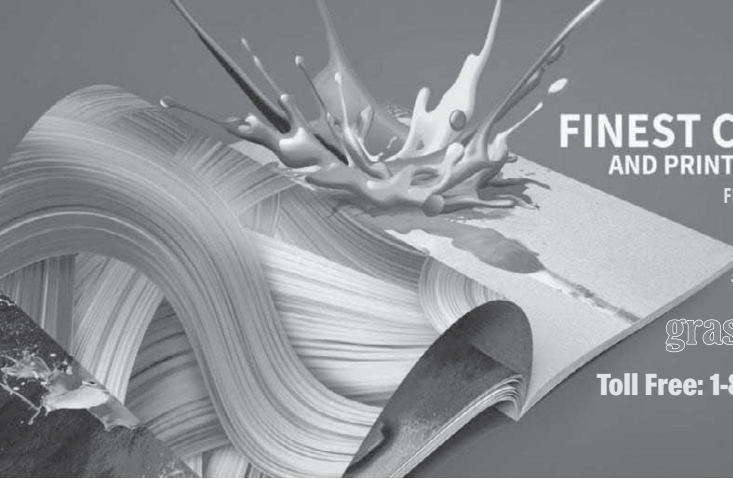

For millions across Canada, this happened when the USA’s Jack Hughes scored on Josh Binnington in overtime of the gold medal game of the Winter Olympics.

Hopefully, this was the kind of hockey game that parents woke their children for, so they could watch as a family and cheer on Team Canada.

Don’t get me wrong, I’m not wishing sadness on anyone, but it isn’t the end.

This is more of a beginning than anything.

Canada and the USA are almost as equal as the day is long.

Maybe they aren’t quite as equal if the referees call a too many men on the ice penalty on the Americans, especially one that obvious, but they didn’t, so we all have to live with it.

Perhaps this game will inspire thousands of Canadians and Americans to play this fantastic game we all call our own.

At the end of the day, the Olympics is far more inspiring to people than NHL hockey, because playing for your own country or watching your country play, just hits different.

Canadians can take some solace in the fact that they were rooting for the better team.

The only problem is that the better team doesn’t always score the goal that wins the championship.

It’s a fine line, but champions don’t always go into the same basket of goods that the best team is in.

The best team doesn’t always have more goals on their side of the scoreboard, but the champions do, and as we’ve all been reminded over the years, there’s no room on the scoreboard for stories.

This time around, it was the USA that earned the crown.

I’ll warn American fans right now, don’t get too comfortable wearing it, because in four years, we’re taking it back.

Spotlight on Gushue at his final Brier

In what will undoubtedly be a week-long celebration of the curling career of Brad Gushue, the 2026 Montana’s Brier will almost certainly crown a rink skipped by somebody else.

This year’s event is being staged this week in St. John’s, NL, where Gushue carries a saint-like aura after an outstanding career as our country’s best-ever curler. But his best days are behind him and if he happened to find some magic and lead his team to victory, it would be one of the biggest upsets in Brier history.

The overwhelming favourite to win the Brier is Brad Jacobs, representing Team Canada. Defending Brier champs and recently returned from the Milan-Cortina Olympics where he won the second gold medal of his career, Jacobs is the favourite in Pool A, the weaker of the two. He has Gushue in his pool, along with rinks from Ontario, Saskatchewan’s Kelly Knapp and Quebec. That competition will feel like your local curling club’s Thursday night men’s league schedule for Jacobs after the world-class field he faced in Italy.

It’s Pool B from where the most likely Jacobs’ rival for the title will come. Pool B features the two best rinks from Manitoba (Matt Dunstone and first-year Brier competitor Braden Calvert), along with Saskatchewan’s Mike McEwen, a regular Brier

hopeful, and four-time champion Kevin Koe from Alberta.

The excitement in St. John’s surrounding Gushue’s final Brier appearance is unprecedented. The ticket allocation has been nearly sold out and there’s even a waiting list for people who want to volunteer.

“I don’t think we’ve seen a Brier like this before, in terms of (someone) retiring at home,” said Eugene Trickett, vice-chair of the organizing committee.

Gushue, meanwhile, hopes to duplicate the feat he and his rink accomplished in 2017, the last time the Brier was held at the Mary Brown Centre in St. John’s. That year, he skipped his rink to his first Brier title, defeating Team Canada, represented by Koe, 7-6 in the final.

Gushue has won an unprecedented six Brier titles, three while representing Team Canada. A rarity among top-level rinks, the Gushue rink has undergone only one lineup change since that first Brier title. Gushue, Mark Nicholls at third and Geoff Walker at lead have been the constants. Second Brett Gallant left the team after the fourth Brier title, replaced by E.J. Harnden in 2023. That second position is now handled by former Brier championship skip Brendan Bottcher. Gallant, meanwhile, joined Bottcher’s team in 2023 and is now is a stalwart on the Jabobs’ squad.

Gushue’s schedule is evidence that he is winding down his career. He has played in about half of the Grand Slam events, and his team’s won-loss record is a mediocre 3-3. There have been no Grand Slam wins this year for Gushue, who has 15 in his illustrious career.

A Gushue Brier victory is unlikely, but what a great Cinderella story it

would be if he and his rink stunned the curling world in front of thousands of adoring fans in St. John’s.

In the deciding game 3, Kipling regained momentum and secured the series with a 7-4 win. Facing Milestone in the next round, Kipling struggled in game one and found themselves out-

Watching the March Night Skies

The moon occults Regulus (twice) and Antares this month, but not for North America. Nonetheless, Regulus is a mere 0.4 degrees south on the opening days of March. The moon is full on March 3rd, which is also at total lunar eclipse (of course, it’s 14 days following the solar eclipse in February). The moon passes completely through Earth’s shadow during the eclipse, so expect to see a deep orange or brown moon. On March 6th, Spica is 1.9 degrees north of the waning gibbous moon. March 10th sees Antares 0.7 degrees north of our satellite, the same day it reaches apogee of 404,384 km. March 17th has Mercury two degrees north of the thin sliver of the waning moon – an early morning event in the eastern twilight. The moon is new on March 18th. The thin sliver of the 1.5-day-old moon is five degrees north of Venus in the western evening sky on March 20, which happens to be the vernal equinox. On March 22nd, the moon reaches perigee of 366,857 km, right up close to the Pleiades and Uranus. March 26th finds Jupiter four degrees south of first-quarter luna; March 27th sees it among the stars of the Beehive Cluster (M44). Once again, Regulus is occulted on March 29th, but only for a small region of northeastern Canada.

Mercury has been hiding in front of the sun, but gradually emerges in the eastern morning twilight, becoming brighter as it moves away from the sun’s glare. This apparition favours Southern

Hemisphere observers.

Venus climbs up the ecliptic as the Evening Star, a welcome beacon throughout the next six months. The brightest planet snuggles up close to Saturn and Neptune on March 7th. A challenge presents itself on March 19th, when the razor-thin crescent moon passes by.

Mars is too close to the sun for viewing until late in the month.

Jupiter is well placed for viewing all month, becoming visible high above Orion, remaining among the stars of Gemini. Double shadows show up on the giant planet’s cloud tops on March 5th. Retrograde motion ceases on the 11th, when Jupiter briefly stands still and begins prograde motion eastward. The waxing gibbous moon glides by on March 26th.

Saturn will be a tough observation, but finding Venus is the west can be a guide on March 7th and 8th. After that, the ringed planet is too close to the sun for viewing.

Uranus remains high above the horizon in Taurus, The Bull. The waxing crescent moon joins the scene on March 22nd.

Neptune is still in Pisces, where it will remain all year. Saturn nearby is an easier find, but they both descend into the Sun’s glare by mid-month.

Daylight Saving Time begins on March 8.

The zodiacal light is visible in northern latitudes in the west after evening twilight for the first two weeks.

The vernal equinox is on March 20, marking the beginning of spring.

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SSWHL looks to the future as their inaugural season draws to a close

On the heels of Canada’s silver medal wins for men’s and women’s hockey at the Winter Olympics in Italy, the women of the Saskatchewan Senior Women’s Hockey League are focused on the future of their organization. On February 17, the league put out a call to the women of Alberta, looking to determine the interest and locations for future teams in that province. On Monday, they did the same for Manitoba. The goal is to form a western league for the start of next year’s hockey season.

In six days, the Alberta survey stood at 208 responses, while Manitoba had already reached 64 in its first 12 hours online.

It’s a dream Jenna Merk, co-founder of the SSWHL, and member of the Vibank Bruins, would not have thought possible this time last year when she and fellow founder Megan LeBlanc had an idea for the Saskatchewan league. It started much the same, with polls of women across the province to find hotspots and gather numbers. From there, the SSWHL was formed, with six teams in the south and five teams in the north.

“When I look back to when we first had this idea, I don’t think either of us thought it was going to get this much traction and build up the way it has,” Merk says. “I remember there were a couple of times where I told the team that every time I go out to play a game, I’m so happy this exists and so proud it exists. I love that I could play competitive hockey again, but I also saw that everyone around me was back playing competitive hockey again. Hockey started to mean something again. It was euphoric in that sense, because it meant something more than just a hockey game every time we stepped on the ice. It



was definitely a passion project in that regard.”

Even as Merk and LeBlanc begin the process of expanding the league across Saskatchewan’s borders and into a prairie league, the inaugural season draws to a close. The Dalmeny Sabres have clinched the northern division and will face the Gull Lake Falcons for the Steffes Cup.

“I think that pressure is what brought the intensity up this year, as well, knowing whoever hoisted the cup was going to be the first,” Merk says. “Gull Lake really represents the strength in the south. I have no doubt they are going to give the north a run for their money, and it’s also exciting to see how the north matches up against the south. We did that north vs. south game, where the south won, so from that you could think that the south might be stronger, but Dalmeny had a lot of players on that north team, so they definitely have that talent.”

Since the SSWHL began its push across the province, girls’ hockey in Saskatchewan seems to have gained new traction. On January 4, the Sedley Women’s Rec team hit the ice for the first time. Brittany Miller, co-founder of the team, attributed the SSWHL to validating female players and bringing visibility to the often male-dominated game.

“When women see opportunities at all

levels from recreational to senior leagues like the SSWHL, it validates hockey for them too,” Miller says. “This growth is being driven by visibility, inclusion, and women supporting women, and it is exciting to be a part of building something that didn’t really exist in our communities before.”

Meanwhile, on January 24, the Prairie Storm female hockey program celebrated their first Her Game Summit. It was an event to showcase the skills of their players ranging from U7 to U13 and celebrate girls in the sport.

Channing Degelman, female director for Prairie Storm Minor Hockey Association, shares a similar sentiment to Miller.

“I think that moving ahead with the professional women’s hockey league just gives these girls a stage, and allows our girls to start dreaming bigger,” Degelman says. “Before, girls just played because they loved the game, but there was an end point, and now that’s moved. It gives us something to dream about, and also gives them more of an opportunity to play their sport longer. Before, if you didn’t get a college scholarship, you were just done. Now there are more girls playing, there’s more girls willing to join those teams at a later date. I feel like numbers are everything in female hockey. If you can get the numbers, it grows the program, and there is more opportunity for everybody involved.”

Merk says those opportunities were one of the driving forces behind the formation of the SSWHL and now the expansion into a prairie league.

“There are people that want to be playing female hockey, and there is a need to grow,” Merk says. “Just hearing them realize they can make that change and they can start creating more opportunities means the world. Knowing there is more going on for female hockey just excites me for what’s to come. It’s so inspirational

and makes me grateful we took the leap. To then hear others are also taking leaps and creating opportunities for girls all around Saskatchewan is really amazing.”

While Alberta and Manitoba are in the works, Merk says the Saskatchewan league will look much the same when next year’s season begins. While a sixth team may be developed for the north in the near future, both sides of the province will remain capped at six teams each.

“With the south for sure, we will stay at the six teams,” Merk says. “There were a couple teams getting ten to twelve players out every game, and we want to allow them to grow and strengthen. If we start having roster problems, we can look at adding a team. For the 2026-2027 season, there will be no south additions. In the north, we had a pretty solid showing. Every team was able to get 16-17 players each game, so we are thinking they can add a sixth team because they only had five this season. So we will be putting out a petition for a sixth team. Where that team will be will depend on who applies and which communities want to take one on. We want to make sure we strengthen before we spread in Saskatchewan.”

Four Cougars will be joining the league next year, as well as players from other colleges and universities as they graduate from their academic programs. Merk expects this to add a new element to the league, as players fresh from competition join their ranks and add new speed and skill to their respective teams.

“It’s euphoric now, being near the end and it all happened as it did,” Merk says. “It happened from all the mentions or when someone came to a game. That community is really what supported what we have done so far. It mattered again. You felt what you were doing mattered. Now it’s on the map. People want to follow along and know more. It goes to show people are excited and interested.”

Gardener’s Corner: Gardener’s dream of May long weekend

It’s about 88 days till the May long weekend, the traditional prairie planting time! At our house, it was practically like one of the key days of the year: there was Christmas, Valentine’s Day (Mom’s birthday!), Easter, and then the May long weekend, aka ‘planting time’.

88 days seems like a long time but look how quickly a week goes by! It does in our house, and I’m sure yours is the same.

So let’s count backwards. For those gardeners who start seeds indoors, it is traditional to start then about 10 weeks before the last frost (which can be anywhere from the second week of May - give or take - to the second week of June - give or take). It’s always a guessing game, and as a famous movie line goes, do we feel lucky today? But if we plan to have seedlings ready to go outdoors for May 25, the EPT (Estimated Planting Time) would be around March 16.

Now before you say anything, I know some gardeners have their seeds started already. It’s old news already! That’s how our house was, Mom couldn’t wait! She was a joyous and enthusiastic gardener, and loved poring over the seeds catalogues and seed packages and choosing the things to plant for the current garden year. I fully understand your enthusiasm if you are one of these gardeners!

However (yes, there’s always a ‘however’), it is always a gardening gamble of when to plant. Early planting will give a head start to our plants, it’s true, but sometimes they get too gangly or damp off and never make it to that joyous day of going out into the garden! And it means much longer that the gardener will have to turn and shift and moved those seedlings around to catch the optimum sun. If you are lucky enough to have grow lights or a solarium, it’s easier. But for many gardeners, finding windowsill and table space by a window is a challenge.

One the other side of the coin, later planting will have plants playing catch up. And still with all the above light challenges.

But you know what? It’s a labor of love and gardeners will take on the challenges and issues of seed-starting just for the pure joy of seeing those lovely plants grow!

Where to begin? Once gardeners have selected their seeds, plant them in a soil-less mix, do not use garden soil. Soil-less mix is lighter and drains well, perfect for new little seedlings.

Choose containers that are not too big (milk cartons are very handy). Fill containers almost to the top with the soilless mix and make a soft depression in the soil for the seeds. When the seeds are planted, cover them lightly, and water gently. (Mom always did this step using a teaspoon, gently spooning room-temperature water over the soil. See how she loved her plants?) As a note, many garden-

ers also like peat pellets: the product that looks like flat cookies then swells when the peat gets wet. When the seeds are planted, cover them lightly. Further watering is not needed at this time since the peat is moist.

After that, label your containers, it is easy to forget what seeds are where!

Some gardeners slide the newly planted containers under the bed in the spare room or cover them lightly with sheets of newspaper. Check daily, and when the first gently bump of a growing seedling begins to show, being them

“Curiosity killed the likes of you,” I’ve often told Grace. Purring as though I’d just paid him a great compliment, he extends one paw and taps my leg. “Not me,” he replies in Cattish. “Never me!”

If Grace could comprehend and heed my warning, his risky chewing habit wouldn’t get him into so much trouble. He chews the rubber ear inserts off my headphones when he finds them on the dresser. The drug may take several days to leave Grace’s system, I’m told. He may lose one or two of his proverbial nine lives. Like any cat owner, I’ll welcome a return to his old ways, although I’d welcome even more a less eager exploration of anything that captures his craving to chew.

Like our errant cat, most of us battle our own cravings. Even with help, some lose that battle. When that craving is a dangerous one, it leads to a lonely life of hiding the habit from those we love and who love us most.

God cares about those who crave. He also cares about the people who care about them. He remains alongside when they stand and never abandons them when they fall. He lovingly directs to a healing path. To practical, non-judgemental help from those who understand the struggle.

If you find yourself there, begin with the same prayer I prayed when I found the half-chewed pill in my kitchen. It’s my most frequent petition. “Lord, help!” He always does, if I watch and listen. It’s the start you may need on what can be a long but worthwhile road to hope and wholeness.

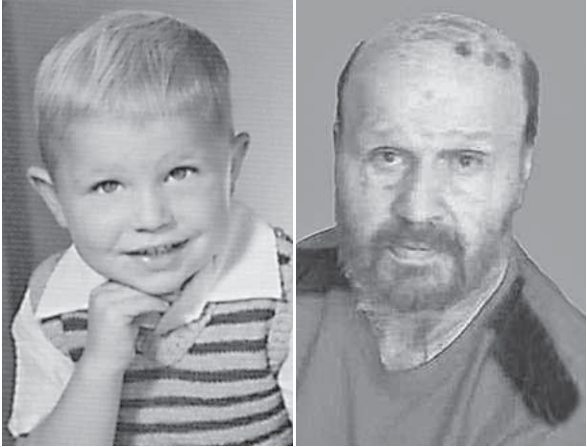

Obituary Christine Parachoniak

March 20, 1928 – Feb. 17, 2026



Christine Waldbauer was born near Killaly, SK, on March 20, 1928, the year that Alexander Fleming discovered penicillin, Walt Disney introduced Mickey Mouse, and 3M gave us Scotch tape.

Christine went to Wallacetown School and completed Grade 8. At a young age, her grandmother died, and Christine was pressed into service to cook and clean for her grandfather in addition to attending school.

Late in her teens, Christine moved to Melville, SK, where she worked first as a caregiver for her sister Helen, then became a waitress at the local "beanery", the train station restaurant used by CN crews and passengers, operating during the era when Melville was a busy rail hub supporting transcontinental passenger service. While working at the beanery, she met Alvin James (Jim) Chapman, who worked at the local telegraph office. Christine and Jim were married and had one child, Herbert Murray Chapman, who was born in 1961.

Throughout her life, Christine worked at many Melville institutions – Sears (Harold Sears store), Nagler's 5 and Dime, and Simpsons Sears catalogue office. She became involved with the Order of the Royal Purple (OORP), the women's auxiliary of the Elks of Canada, where she went on to serve as Honoured Royal Lady. Through the OORP, Christine performed various acts of service to the Melville community, including volunteering at St. Paul Lutheran Home.

Following James's death to cancer in 1974, Christine eventually entered a relationship with Nick Harry Parachoniak, whom she knew through the Elks organization. Christine and Harry were married and went on to spend over 25 years together before Harry passed in 2017.

In 2003, Christine's sister, Helena Schofer (Helen), passed away. Helen's passing left a huge gap in Christine's life. In addition to being sisters, the two were best friends, and Christine never recovered from losing her. In 2019, Christine gave up her home on 7th Avenue, where she had lived most of her adult life, and moved into Cumberland Villas (formerly Caleb). While at Cumberland, Christine was involved in their community activities, including daily coffee with friends, cards three times a week, and bingo. In June of 2025, it was determined that Christine needed more care than Cumberland could provide and was moved to Yorkton Crossing, a residence that could provide the "assisted living" she required. In January of 2026, after multiple falls, Christine was admitted to St. Peter's Hospital in Melville, where she was assessed and moved to long-term care in St. Paul Lutheran Home in early February, where she lived out the remainder of her life. Harold Douglas Ecklund May 30, 1927 – Feb. 17, 2026

Oh Lord it’s Hard to be Humble

The man, the myth, the legend. Harold Douglas Ecklund closed his last gate on Tuesday, Feb. 17, 2026. He was always a morning person and it was fitting that Dad got dressed, said “Good morning” to the staff at Zagime and collapsed on his walker. He did not cause a fuss or commotion, but he also did not get a chance to say one last word of advice or a well told, completely off colour and definitely not politically correct joke. He was tired. He was worn out and he was ready.

Dad was born on May 30th, 1927 on the family farm in the Percival district, one of the earliest Swedish settlements in SK. He was the first son of George and Esther (nee Olson). The old farmhouse would see the birth of three more siblings to Dad. The Irish twin Keith would follow shy of 14 months later followed by Stan in 1929 and “Precious” Doris in 1932. The old farmhouse sadly lost a little one at three weeks, but a few years later in 1939, Sidney came along. This youngest Ecklund was lucky to be born in the Whitewood Hospital. Thus, the moniker, “Sid the Suck” began.

Harold attended Newborger School #2657 at the tender age of six. He knew no English at this time but would learn it at school then come home and teach his siblings his new found knowledge. This is a trait that he carried with him all his life. Telling his minions what to do and how to do it. He was so known for his sayings, phrases and life lessons usually in ten words or less. “Did you miss that class on closing gates?” or “Bet you won’t forget this, cause I won’t let you.” Or ones that we all carried into adulthood: “It’s one thing to do something stupid but it’s ten times worse to stand there and defend that stupidity!”

Handsome Hal worked hard all his life. His, “I didn’t get much education so I always had to use my brains” was doled out regularly. However, Dad did get his Grade XI through correspondence. A big deal to our mom who was always proud of that fact. After this diploma in 1948, Dad worked at Stewart’s Lumber camp in Flanders Ontario, with Harold Anderson and brother Keith where they cut eight-foot spruce trees for \$2.40 a cord. He worked hard in the cold and wind, meeting new people and writing home to our mom.

In 1949-50, Dad worked in a Planer Mill in the Upper Frazier Valley in B.C. He worked on pile drivers and his job was to paint the pile as they were driven. On a visit back to the farm, he asked our mom Phyllis Fitzpatrick to marry him and on November 1st, 1949 they were engaged. I guess Dad had enough of being a lumber jack as they were married the following October and in 1950-51, he was a little closer to home, running a pole truck at the Co-op Refinery in Regina.

But “Big Swede” could not stay away from the farm. In 1951 Mom and Dad moved to the old Hawkes farm. That’s where the real living began. Dad started his infamous ranching career with one cow that Grandpa Fitz (Our mom’s dad) gave him for a wedding gift. From there he worked off the farm to build up his herd. He worked building elevators and also he and his brother Keith ran a gravel hauling business for the old Number One highway and local RM’s. In 1951 Linda arrived so life as a farming family officially started. In 1954 Ken was born and would become his farming partner for decades. Until then however, Harold farmed with Keith and his dad George until 1957. Gary was born in 1959. In 1961, he partnered with Sid and together the brothers raised their families (Brian born in 1963 and Laurie in 1965) side by side with the cousins getting into many shenanigans over the years. According to the cousins they had the best life growing up as farm kids and best friends. George was still farming with his sons and at 73 he could still be seen picking stones and that’s when Ken entered the picture. Grandpa George retired and Ken took up the reins. After Ken’s first year at university in 1974, he and Dad formed a partnership.

Although Dad worked on the farm all his life, all work and no play was not his motto. Mom and Dad travelled with friends to Vegas, Mexico, California and most memorable to Sweden with Linda at the helm. That trip was the “Trip of a Lifetime” he said for years. Dad also did solo trips to Texas to see his brother Stan and to see cousins in Burns Lake and Prince George BC. He also made it to the Dominican for his grandson’s wedding. Trips to Calgary for the Stampede, the Brier with friends, visits with Doris and Roger, skiing with Brian and Laurie when they were little and visiting with his own dad who lived with Doris during that time were precious memories. Attending Brian’s 60th birthday in Calgary and meeting all Brian’s friends was a highlight for Brian. He had told his friends and Ag customers about this Big Swede for years and now they could finally meet the man behind the stories.

Family trips to Hamilton to visit Stan and our Mom’s sisters were fairly regular. One memorable family trip was to Expo ’67 in Montreal. Dad had a brand new 1966 Chevy truck with a topper. So, with a full tank of purple gas and \$375 cash (probably borrowed) the three older kids crawled into the truck (Linda and Ken in the back) and off they went. Having been pretty frugal, sleeping and eating in campgrounds and the two oldest kids having their own money and with fuel being 35 cents a gallon, Dad even came home with a little cash in his own pocket.

Handsome Hal was always active in curling and later in life, golfing. He also had a dog. Herp (2, 2.0, 2.1) could be found in the back of his truck or curled up on the step. Between his active social life along with his dog, Dad managed to get off the farm again in January 2014 at the age of 86 when Linda took him on a Caribbean Cruise. He only renewed his passport for five years though as he knew nothing



was a guarantee. However, saying that, in the same year he purchased a new fuel tank for the farm and signed a five-year contract with the coop! (At his passing the fuel tank had been paid off for six years! Yet he still would not buy green bananas.)

Even though Dad loved his free time and the cabin now was taken care by Gary, retirement was not in Dad’s sights and when Ken brought up selling the cows, Dad would have none of it. Ken had to work off the farm and he thought selling the cows, would make things easier. Dad won and continued that task until 2018.

When Dad started slowing down, meaning he watched more curling than played, couldn’t get in and out of a fishing boat easily, did not attend two men’s golf nights each week and started using a cane, the family got homcare involved. Dad wanted to be on the farm and with the wonderful homcare staff coming twice a week to make a few meals and “supervise” him in the tub, he was able to do just that. He would call Gary daily whenever he had a question on the sump pump, septic pump out, washing machine, lazy boy chair, or the television remote. Gary had so much more confidence than we had with our dad and technology, he even had him working an iPad so he could watch his old favourites like Bonanza, Gunsmoke and Cheers. If it wasn’t Gary helping dad out, it was Ken. Once Dad admitted that he probably should not be driving, Ken would pick up Dad twice a day. Once in the morning for breakfast at the CanAm and then again in the afternoon for Happy Hour. Dad treasured those times as being in the know, surrounded by family and friends was what our socialite father loved. In hindsight he probably suffered from FOMO and his children probably inherited this as well!

Dirty Harry had many claim to fames but only having moved a mile in his entire life was definitely one of the big ones. However, in November of 2023, Dad agreed to try assisted living in Broadview at Zagime. There he was greeted with another great, caring staff who accepted his partaking of supper a little later than the other residents to accommodate his happy hour priorities. His good friend Denis would pick him up every day, sometimes earlier than 3:30 to go for a drive before the gathering. His youngest daughter Laurie would drive from Saskatoon and pick him up regularly, usually every three weeks to have a weekend at the farm. When this happened, Ken would pick Dad up in the morning and go for breakfast and in the afternoon Harold and Laurie would visit friends, do errands, get a haircut or go for a drive. Dad loved these trips to the farm, as he still felt the farmer inside him and he would always rubber neck as we passed Dallas’ yard to see if his truck was at the shop and if it was, we would whip in there for a quick catch up and depending on the season, talk about calving, harvest, seeding, latest machine purchases and of course latest breakdowns.

Dad was doing a little doctoring in the fall of 2025. Denis took him to the Broadview Hospital for his cough. He received some antibiotics and was told to use his puffer. Around this time, Ken took Dad and Sid to Moose Jaw to visit with their brother Keith and Dad was so glad they did that as he figured it would be the last time they could all be together. The trip to Saskatoon on October 25 for his granddaughter’s wedding was another highlight. However, on a second trip to the doctor, just before Christmas, Dad was diagnosed with congestive heart failure. He had a great Christmas with the family, staying at the farm, playing lots of crib, watching the news and having daily Happy Hours with neighbours and friends.

On February 14th of this year, as Laurie and Harold went for a drive, he couldn’t believe that the weather was so beautiful. He recalled his own dad’s birthday (on the 14th) so many years ago when horses and cutters were used to gather together in celebration and the wind and cold would cut right through you. He commented how we now drive around in luxury with heated seats and steering wheels. Dad had seen so many changes in his almost 100 years, the same as his own Dad, our Grandpa George who also passed away at...98.

Harold leaves to continue his stewardship of land and life his four children: Ken (Donalda), Gary (Sandra) and first wife Dianne, Brian and Laurie(John) and first husband Joel, his ten grandchildren and ten great-grandchildren: Miranda (Chris) and their children Tala and Mavrik, Derek (Jess) and their children Kai, Jagger and Crue and Morgan (Sheola), Roxann (Mike) and their children Amilee and Freya, Kate and her children Ainsley, Gunner and Brooklyn, Alexsa (Lane) and Kali, Makayla (Sheldon), Carmen (Tyler) and Jake (Hanna). He also leaves to mourn his brother Keith (Edna); sister Doris Haynes; brother Sid (Maryanne) and many nieces and nephews.

Harold was predeceased by his wife of 59 years Phyllis, his grandson Jason, his brother Stan and his daughter Linda.

Rest in peace Dad. You always said, “Blessed are those who go quickly.” You were loved by so many, for so long and a huge hole has been left in our hearts and in our communities. It is the loss of an era.

A visitation was held in the Broadview Community Centre, Broadview, Saskatchewan on Thursday, Feb. 26, 2026 at 1 p.m. The funeral service followed in the same location at 2 p.m., officiated by Pastor James R. Graham. A private family interment will take place in Percival Cemetery.

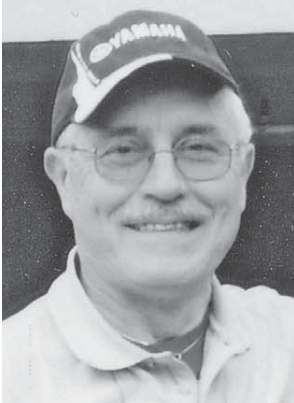
